Dr. Manuel Amador's Name Put Forward as "Favorite Son"

The American Consul at Cartagena Gets into Hot Water.

Panama, Nov. 26.—The junta, composed of Jose Augustin Arango, Tomas Arias and Manuel S. Bonifacio, held a meeting at 10 o'clock this morning, all the ministers of state and controllers being present.

The decision of the junta was received with great joy throughout the isthmus, without distinction to party classes.

El Cronista, an old newspaper of the Republic, publishes a long article on the career of Dr. Manuel Amador, minister of finance of the Republic.

Municipalities throughout the isthmian territory continue to present resolutions declaring that Dr. Amador is the "favorite son of the republic."

On the 21st, shortly after the decree closing that port to vessels to and from Bolivia was published, the steamer Trent for Limon, Costa Rica, which the Trent accepted, knowing there would be no difficulties at Cartagena.

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Postponed Action Regarding Sealing

Local Board of Trade Holds Meeting But Fails of Decisive Action.

Importance of Industry to Victoria is Explained by The Speakers.

A special general meeting of the Board of Trade was held yesterday evening for the consideration of the following resolution:

Resolved, That it is the opinion of the Board that no time should be lost in impressing upon the provincial government the necessity of immediately instituting a certain number of pounds of leaf must be brought in.

This amount is determined beforehand by the manager of the factory, and on the condition of the leaf. Extra pay is given for whatever quantity is brought in above the required amount of the day, and in this way many good workers earn double pay during the season.

The leaf is taken to the withering room, where it is laid out on a cement floor, and women carefully pick out any foreign matter, such as little sticks and pieces of stone, which would be injurious to the health of the workmen.

The object of rolling is to liberate the juices of the leaf, and during the operation the leaf is rolled in a machine, which turns the leaf to a bright green to a slightly yellowish tint.

In former years the rolling was done by hand, and the workmen were paid by the piece, and the quality of the leaf was not so uniform as it is now.

The tea is now dry and crisp, and is the tea of commerce. During the process of curing, the tea is exposed to a temperature of 240 and 300 degrees Fahrenheit.

The tea is then packed into chests, and is ready for export. The chests are packed in a special way, and are protected from moisture and other injurious influences.

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Balfour Defends the War Office

Premier Presides at Banquet and Shows Inconsistency of Liberals.

The Army Habitually Starved By Predecessors With Inevitable Results.

London, Nov. 27.—Premier Balfour, presiding at the annual banquet of the United War Office, delivered a speech which was devoted entirely to the reforms instituted by the War Office, and which were the result of the investigations of the Balfour committee.

The Balfour committee was appointed in 1902, and its report was published in 1903. It was the result of a long and careful investigation into the state of the War Office, and its findings were most startling.

The Balfour committee found that the War Office was in a state of chronic mismanagement, and that the army was being starved of the resources it needed to maintain its efficiency. The committee recommended a number of reforms, which have since been adopted by the War Office.

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
