The declaration of war be-tween England and Egypt was made yesterday morning and the bombardment of Alexandria was commenced at 7 o'clock this morning. Its onward movement will very likely throw Turkey into the treacherous embrace of Russia. War between Turkey and France means war between England and Russia. The latter has never ceased to covet the city of the eastern Cæsars. The conflict, whose details our columns give, may lead to far-reaching results, which may be felt even by ourselves.

DECLARATION OF WAR. ALEXANDRIA, July 10 .- Notice of the bombardment of Alexandria was given this morning by letter addressed to the gov by Admiral Seymour. Mr. Cartwright, the acting British consul here, has written to Ragheb Pasha, president of the Cyprus.
