Campbell as registrar in Milton, when one of the reasons given had been that he had dons good service to his party, was mentioned. The cost of the Parliament buildings was another question dealt with by the nominee. The original grant skeed for was \$500,000; afterwards \$750,000. In all probability the final cost would equal two millions. The expenditure might have been proper, but the Government was not justified in making contracts of this kind without consulting the people's representatives, and the cost was going to be more than the people had under-stood at the last general elections. Beparate schools, while guaranteed to

going to be there than the people and inder-stood at the last general elections. Separate schools, while guaranteed to Roman Catholics by the act of confedera-tion, were not approved of. The Colonel re-gretied that they had ever been estab-lished, on the ground that they are not as efficient and the instruction not so complete as that received in public schools, and it was unwise that Roman Catholic and Protestant children should be educated under a separate system of education. He did not think that Catholics as a rule asked for these schools. They were not in the interests of the Catholic laity but of the Catholic clergy. Nor did he approve of separate school representation on laity but of the Catholic clergy. Nor did he approve of separate school representation on high school boards. The text books supplied to public schools were too dear and it was to the credit of the Ontario Opposition that they had been reduced at all. These and many other principles Col.
