The Mayor answered that his statement had been misconstrued. He meant to intimate that there was no need of publishing the results of the analyses, though, if necessary, the public could be told that it would be safer to boil the water before using it.

As the board treated the matter of making an analysis in a rather flippant manner the doctor proceeded to enlighten them regarding the amount of work entailed. Not one but many tests, he stated, would have to be made before a correct conclusion could be reached, as, improbable as it might appear, the water drawn from the well was at times purer than samples taken from the mouth of the intake pipe.

The few words, however, were productive of a perfect tornado of insinuating denunciation from a most unexpected quarter. It was Ald. Kill, who rose to take issue with the Mayor, and the board leaned back aghast as he boldly proclaimed that an election intrigue was behind this dredge-purchasing scheme and that it was concected by a man who would see that the foreman in charge would be one who could command a good many votes about election time.

By this time His Worship had somewhat recovered from the surprise engendered by the attack from one of the stanuchest members of the administration, and he sprang up as soon as Ald. Hill took his seat.

Presuming that the insinuation was levelled at his head he wished to take occasion to deny that he had ever solicited the vote of any man, much less the vote of one whom he had placed in a position. He challenged any one to cite an instance where such had been the case.






