



The indications of worms are restlessness, grinding of the teeth, picking of the nose, extreme peevishness, often convulsions. One of the greatest drawbacks to the storing of ice is the lack of suitable material cannot always be got, but the chaft of oats, wheat, barley, and especially flax makes a very satisfactory substitute. It should be collected at threshing time and stored where it will keep dry until it is needed. In packing ice, take care to fill all crevices.
