MEETING OF SCHOOL BOARD

New Room to be Opened for Primary Pupils.—Teachers Salaries Discussed.—\$100 Increase Voted to Principal Bustin.

To the Editor of the Monitor:
At your request I take pleasure in presenting to your readers the following summary of work done at the annual meeting of the Board of School Commissioners of the town, held in the Clerk's office on Tuesday afternoon the 18th, inst.
Miss Winifred Hoyt's resignation of the position of teacher of the Primary classes was respectfully accepted, and her salary, Miss Bosse, was appointed to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the term.
Owing to the continually increasing numbers in attendance at the school, it was deemed necessary to make arrangements for the furnishing with seats of the only room now vacant, so that it may be ready for use at the beginning of the next term.
The matter of additional heating of the building was under consideration, although nothing final was decided upon, it was agreed that something must be done before another winter to make the young people more comfortable.
By an unanimous vote it was resolved to increase the salary of the Principal by the sum of \$100, as an expression of our satisfaction with his work, and as necessary to place him on substantially the same footing as other teachers in similar positions.
The question of increasing the salaries of our lady teachers was discussed, and it was acknowledged that the amount they now receive is not at all equivalent to the worth of their services. But it was decided that the condition of the finances of the town do not warrant the desired increase. The teachers are all fulfilling their duties with commendable zeal and very general satisfaction.
The Board is required at its annual meeting to prepare estimates of expenditures to be submitted to the Council in providing the needed.
Their estimates for 1908-9 are as follows:
Renting expenses \$ 1750.00
Fuel, on school bonds 100.00
Sinking fund 250.00
Salaries of Clerk 120.00
Five ops. increase of salaries 70.00
Fitting room with desks 100.00
Total \$ 2590.00
Take from this amount \$2500.00
County grant to school \$238.31
Paid by outside students 40.00 378.31
Estimated total to be provided \$2211.69
This amount exceeds 65 per cent of the revenues of the town which has been granted in some preceding years. But our low expenditure would undoubtedly result in lessening the efficiency of the work done.

Amendments to Canada Temperance Act

(Published by request.)
An Act to amend Chapter 100, Revised Statutes, 1900, "The Liquor License Act," and amendments thereof.
Enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly in this behalf assembled, in the following manner:
1. Section 2 of chapter 100, Revised Statutes, 1900 "The Liquor License Act" is amended in the following paragraph:
(1) The expression "person" means a person, firm or corporation.
2. Sub-section 3 of section 57 of the said chapter repealed, and the following substituted therefor:
(3) Every person who violates any of the provisions of this Act shall be liable to a penalty of not less than twenty dollars, nor more than fifty dollars.
(b) For a second offence he shall be liable to a penalty of not less than forty dollars, nor more than eighty dollars, and for a third or any subsequent offence he shall be liable to a penalty of not less than eighty dollars, and in addition thereto to imprisonment with hard labor for a period not exceeding two months, in addition to any term of imprisonment to which the defendant is liable in default of payment of the penalty. A conviction for a third or any subsequent offence shall be in the form in the second schedule, or to the like effect.
(2) A conviction under this chapter shall be a bar only to the offence, disclosed in the evidence given on the trial of the information resulting in such conviction.
3. The said chapter is amended by adding thereto the following sections:
187. Every licensee or other person who, himself, or by his clerk, servant or agent, sends or causes to be sent, liquor to any person, other than a legally qualified physician, chemist or druggist, or an agent for the sale of liquor duly appointed in any city, town or municipality in which the Canada Temperance Act is in force, or in any town or other district in which no license under this chapter is in force, shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars for the first offence, and of one hundred dollars for a second offence, and two hundred dollars for a third and each subsequent offence.
(2) Upon a complaint in writing made to the municipal, city or town council by which the license was issued, that any licensee has been convicted of a second offence under this section, such council shall, after ten days' notice to the licensee, examine into such complaint, and if it is proved to their satisfaction that such conviction has been made, forfeit and cancel the license of such licensee.
(3) In any prosecution under this section, the onus shall be upon the defendant of proving that the person to whom the liquor was sent was a legally qualified physician, chemist or druggist, or an agent for the sale of liquor, duly appointed; and if in such prosecution it is proved that the liquor came from the warehouse or store, or out of the possession of the defendant or his agent, the onus shall be upon the defendant of proving that the person who sent, or caused to be sent, such liquor, was not his agent.
187. No common carrier, express company or other carrier shall accept from any licensee or other person any package containing liquor for carriage or delivery to any person other than a legally qualified physician, chemist or druggist, or an agent for the sale of liquor duly appointed in any city, town or municipality in which the Canada Temperance Act is in force, or in any town or other district in which no license under this chapter is in force.
(2) Any person or the agent or manager of any carrier violating the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of not less than twenty or more than fifty dollars.
(3) In any action or prosecution under the provisions of this section, it shall not be a good defence that the person to whom such package was consigned was not a duly qualified physician, chemist or druggist, or an agent for the sale of liquor duly appointed, unless, after making due enquiry, he has been unable to ascertain the facts.
188. Every licensee or other person who, himself, or by his clerk, servant or agent, sends, or causes to be sent, liquor through the agency of any common carrier, express company or other carrier, into any city, town or other municipality in which the Canada Temperance Act is in force, or into any town or other district in which no license under this chapter is in force, shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars for the first offence, and of one hundred dollars for a second offence, and two hundred dollars for a third and each subsequent offence.
189. Every common carrier, express company or other carrier who knowingly takes or carries liquor from one place to another, or who, at the request or on behalf of any licensee or other person into any city, town or other municipality in which the Canada Temperance Act is in force, or into any town or other district in which no license under this chapter is in force, shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars for each offence.

Stoessel Condemned to Death

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 20.—Lieutenant General Stoessel was condemned to death this evening by military court for the surrender of Port Arthur. The court, General Peck, who commanded the fourth East Siberian division at Port Arthur, was ordered to pronounce a disciplinary sentence on General Stoessel, who was connected with the surrender, and General Smirnov, acting commandant of the fortress, and Major-General Heise, chief of staff to General Stoessel, were acquitted of the charges against them for lack of proof. The court recommended that the death sentence upon General Stoessel be commuted to one years imprisonment, but that there were tears in the eyes of General Reiss.
The sentence of death was pronounced upon General Stoessel for surrendering the fortress before all the means of defence had been exhausted; for failing to enforce his authority and for military mismanagement.
Commutation of the sentence was asked on the ground that Port Arthur had been overwhelmed, defended itself under General Stoessel's leadership with unexampled stubbornness and filled the world with astonishment at the heroic courage of its garrison; that several assaults had been repulsed with tremendous loss to the enemy; that General Stoessel throughout the siege had maintained the heroic courage of the defenders, and finally, that he had taken an energetic part in three campaigns.

Law and Order League

Bridgetown Awakening to the Necessity for Concerted Action in the Enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act.

On Friday evening last, the 21st, inst., a meeting of the citizens of Bridgetown was convened in the school room of the Baptist church, to consult with reference to the evident non-enforcement in the town of the Canada Temperance Act. After the appointment of a chairman and remarks by several gentlemen, the Constitution of a Law and Order League which has been in operation with good results in other towns of the province was read, and a resolution was carried by a practically unanimous vote to the effect that it is desirable that a Law and Order League for the town of Bridgetown be organized on the lines of the Constitution aforesaid. Subsequently at the call of the Chair, a good number of persons present handed in their names as members of the proposed league. These persons and all others who desire to join the League were requested to meet in Warren's Hall on Tuesday evening, the 25th, inst., for the purpose of organization.
The meeting was held accordingly last evening, and was a large and representative gathering of the citizens of the town with Rev. A. S. Lewis as chairman. The Constitution of the Law and Order League was read and nearly all present subscribed their names to support it. A discussion of several points contained in the by-laws and their application then followed, after which a nominating committee appointed the following officers:

The meeting was then adjourned sine die.

What is the Brown-Tail Moth?

To the Editor of the Monitor:
In the last two months I have had over seven hundred nests, cocoons, webs, etc. brought to me for identification and not one of them a brown-tail moth nest. When I was compelled to send away, without a cent, a little chap, who had walked five miles, to bring me a collection, consisting principally of insects, moth nests of eggs, I have concluded, to save myself and others trouble, it would be well to give one or two points in the life history of this pest, for the benefit of the readers of the Monitor.
1st. The Brown Tailed Moth nest is found on the ends of the branches of the tree.
2nd. The nest consists of two or three dead leaves interwoven and covered with a tough fibrous web, not easily pulled apart.
3rd. The nest at this season of the year, or approximately from Nov. to May, contains a number of small caterpillars, not eggs. These may appear dead but they are only in a state of torpor and warmth will bring them out.
The above is all that is necessary to prevent the common mistake that are being made regarding the identity of the brown tailed moth. While we hope that many may not be found, still it is not well to relax vigilance, since several nests were found in the vicinity of Bridgetown last year.
