Postal regulations.

Mails are conveyed twice each way every day, except Sunday, over the principal lines of railway in Canada. Over the less important lines of railway they are carried only once each way every day, except Sunday.

Mails are also conveyed once each way every day, except Sunday, over the principal lines of common road; and once, twice, or three times per week over the less important lines of common road.

The postal communication between Ontario and Quebec and the lower Provinces is six times per week each way via Quebec, Rivière du Loup and Edmundston, once per week each way by steamers from Quebec to Picton, and daily by Railway via Bangor, Me., and McAdam Junction, Me., per week steamer between Portland and Halifax.

The most speedy and direct postal route from Canada to almost every portion of the globe with the exception of the Continent of America, the Isthmus of Panama, New Zealand, China and Japan and the West India Islands, is by way of England, whence mails for the several British Colonies and Foreign Countries are regularly despatched.

The most speedy and direct postal route from Canada to all parts of the Continent of North America, South America, the West Indies, Central and South America, is via New York.

The most direct postal route to New Zealand, China and Japan is via Detroit and San Francisco.

Mails for England are despatched as follows: By mail Steam Packets sailing from Quebec in summer and Portland in winter every Saturday; and from Halifax, Nova Scotia, every alternate Friday. By Steamer from New York every Wednesday.
