Commercial Summary.

The estate of Samuel Corrigan, dry goods dealer, Yorkville, Ont., whose assignment was noticed in a recent issue, promises to yield a larger dividend than was expected. The assets amounted to about \$17,000, and liabilities to \$15,000.

The wholesale and retail grocery firm of Logan, Lindsay & Co., St. John, N.B., have assigned to Messrs. Wm. Kennedy, Geo. Robertson, and A. C. Blair, three local creditors. The liabilities, although not yet definitely known, are said to be heavy.

It is believed by some of the creditors, that the estate of J. S. Coatsworth & Bro., builders and contractors, Toronto, whose assignment was noticed last week, will pay in full. The firm were forced into making an assignment by one or two local creditors who were pressing them.

The new knitting mill at Kingston, Ont., has commenced operations. It is stated that the Company have orders on hand sufficient to keep the mill running for two months, and that 75 to 100 dozen shirts and drawers per day can be made. The building, constructed of brick, is three stories high, one hundred feet long and sixty wide, and cost \$17,000.

The bankrupt stock of Mr. A. A. Maybee's general store at Warkworth, Ont., was sold in Toronto last week at 67c on the dollar.—Robt. Balfour, general dealer, Port Colborne, Ont., whose career must be fully known to our readers, has assigned to Mr. E. R. C. Clarkson, Toronto, having been unable to meet his payments on the 80 per cent. compromise of liabilities amounting to \$18,000, effected last March.

The following, all in this city, are applying for discharge under the Insolvent Act of 1875 and amending Acts: Henry Mulholland individually and of the late firm of Mulholland & Baker, hardware merchants; Wm. Stafford & Co., wholesale boots and shoes; Hector Munro, architect, in his capacity of curator to the vacant estate of the late E. S. Freer, insolvent; and M. H. Utley, physician and trader.—Frederick Dale, Sherbrooke and Onesime Leblanc, Three Rivers, Que., are also applying for a discharge.
