Persecution of Nuns in Carrickmacross. —A meeting of the Carrickmacross Board of Guardians was held on Aug. 2, to con-sider the unsanitary state of the river from Stranton's Lake through the grounds of the Catholic convent. Recently Mr. Gibbings diverted the course of Straton's Lake, anddrew away the water, leaving it almost empty. His action had the effect of drawing the water from the convent premises; and in addition he built up the eye of the bridge so as to prevent any water flowing into the convent grounds. Mr. Daly said there were different opinions as to the cause of Mr. Gibbings' action. Some people attributed it to a desire to annoy the nuns: but he had never known a shabbier act.
