## 2007 DFAIT Leadership Conference: Building Tomorrow



Minister of International Trade David Emerson outlined current trade priorities and the importance of leadership in this context.

The 2007 DFAIT Leadership Conference was held on November 28 and 29, 2007, at the Lac Leamy Hilton. Over 300 DFAIT managers and executives from headquarters, regional offices, Passport Canada and a number of missions abroad attended. The conference's theme, "Building Tomorrow," reflected the importance of leadership in facing current and future challenges at DFAIT.



Minister of Foreign Affairs Maxime Bernier spoke on current foreign affairs priorities and thanked the Department for its professionalism.

The major objectives of the conference included:

- Advancing a common understanding of DFAIT priorities and the importance of leadership in the context of the ongoing transformation of the department;
- Identifying and discussing the challenges and opportunities facing the Department; and

 Determining priorities and strategic leadership objectives for the coming year.

Deputy Ministers Len Edwards and Marie-Lucie Morin opened the conference by outlining Canada's foreign and trade policy directions and priorities, and their vision for the ongoing transformation of the department, which includes the completion of the Alignment Review and the Strategic Review exercises. The Deputy Ministers announced at the conference the creation of an Office for Transformation—headed by Lucie Edwards—which is mandated to articulate and implement DFAIT's transformation agenda.

Participants were provided the opportunity to participate in six interactive workshops over the two-day period, which included topics such as:

- DFAIT leadership, governance and accountability in policy, program and service delivery;
- DFAIT transformation through leadership and learning aligned to government priorities; and
- Values-based leadership, empowerment and engagement for organizational performance.
