Economic and financial review, 1011-17; new and increased taxes; short-term loan of \$200,000,000; repatriation of Canadian securities held in London; increase in cash reserves in banks, 1012; success of first war loan; inauguration of war savings certificates programme; institution of foreign exchange control board and controls exercised through various war boards; large wheat crop of last year; recession of business with United States and increase in exports to Great Britain, 1013; increase in industrial production and rise in retail sales; fall in number of employable persons on relief rolls; estimated defence expenditure of \$700 million, 1014; shortages in certain types of skilled labour; facilitation of entrance of young men to the trades; measures taken to increase our national income; great increase in our imports, 1015; impossibility of converting surplus sterling arising from increased sales to Britain into United States money; trend of our wartime import and export trade; competition for foreign exchange with which to purchase imports; establishment of foreign exchange control board and work of board, 1016; government accounts, 1939-40: revenue from taxes; total expenditures estimated at \$681 millions; loss on wheat crop through Canadian Wheat Board of at least \$52 millions, 1017; main categories of expenditure; net income deficit on Canadian National Railway of slightly over \$40 millions; actual deficit approximately \$118 millions as compared with \$51 millions in 1938-39; rise in net debt of the Dominion to approximately \$3,270,980,000 as at March 31, 1940; outstanding unmaturing direct funded debt; lowering of average rate
