CAMBODIA-SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES OF INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION

Hon. D. S. Harkness (Calgary North): Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask the Secretary of State for External Affairs whether he has seen the statement of the Secretary of State of the United States, as follows:

We have been very much interested in the sug-gestion that has been made, I think more than once, by Prince Sihanouk that the international control commission should strengthen its personnel and its capabilities in order to assure the neutrality and territorial integrity of Cambodia.

I also should like to ask the Secretary of State for External Affairs whether he has given any thought to, or has contemplated any action in respect of, the move to Cambodia for this purpose of many of the presently underemployed staff of the international control commission who now are situated in Viet Nam.

Hon. Paul Martin (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, as my hon. friend will recall, I dealt with this question in the external affairs committee. There has been a suggestion made by Prince Sihanouk of Cambodia but no progress has been made as to whether the other members of the commission would be prepared to accept the suggestion for an expanded role for the commission. The statement of the Secretary of State was noted by me, and we have been discussing the matter with those concerned.

Mr. Harkness: I have a supplementary question. Has the minister discussed with the other members of the joint commission, India and Poland, the possibility of moving a large proportion of that staff to Cambodia where they could possibly perform a very useful function?

Mr. Martin (Essex East): I do not agree with my hon, friend's premise, Mr. Speaker. Speaker, I should like to address my question

received on Saturday protesting the prosecu- The question as to what the commission might do in Cambodia would only arise if the request for its use in the particular circumstances was in accord with the Geneva agreement.
