In addition to these amounts, persons of age 66 and over, with the necessary residence qualifications, would be eligible for the Old Age Security pension of \$78 per month in 1969 plus the Guaranteed Income Supplement of up to \$31.20 for those with the lower incomes.

Some of these pensioners will be receiving additional pensions in respect of service in the Armed Forces of the R.C.M.P. or other employment. The cases shown in this table, where there is a combination of long service and small pension, can arise from two sources: (1) Newfoundland Government employees who transferred to the federal service in 1949 at the time of Union who retired soon after transfer and before their higher federal government salaries had been received long enough to raise the pension level, and (2) Revenue and Assistant Revenue Postmasters in low revenue offices who were brought under the Civil Service Superannuation Act in the late '40's.

All cases which have been identified are of the former category.
