

Arms of the Ducal House of Hamilton from which, through Sir David Hamilton of Cadzow, a second son, John Hamilton of Muirhouse and Olivestob, sprang: Gules, three cinquefoils ermine (or later, pierced ermine). Crest: Out of a ducal coronet, an oak tree fructed and penetrated transversely in the main stem by a frame saw proper, the frame or. Motto, "Through."

Arms probably borne by the Boreland Hamiltons and their descendant John Hamilton of Muirhouse and Olivestob, and about 1700, formally assumed by John Hamilton's descendants, the Hamiltons of Innerdovot: Gules, a crescent argent between three cinquefoils ermine within a bordure embattled or.

Arms of Colonel Thomas Hamilton of Olivestob, fourth son of John Hamilton of Muirhouse and Olivestob, registered 1678: Gules, a martlet between three cinquefoils argent, within a bordure embattled or. Crest: An antelope's head proper, gorged and attired gules. Motto, "*In via virtuti pervia.*"
