Arms of the Ducal House of Hamilton from which, through Sir David Hamilton of Cadsow, a second son, John Hamilton of Muirhouse and Olivestob, sprang: Gules, three cinquefoils ermins (or later, pierced ermine). Crest: Out of a ducal coronet, an oak tree fructed and penetrated transversely in the main stem by a frame saw proper, the frame or. Motto, "Through."

Arms probably borne by the Boreland Hamiltons and their descendant John Hamilton of Muirhouse and Olivestob, and about 1700, formally assumed by John Hamilton's descendants, the Hamiltons of Innerdovst: Gules, a crescent argent between three oinquefoils ermine within a bordure embattled or.

Arms of Colonel Thomas Hamilton of Olivestob, fourth son of John Hamilton of Muirhouse and Olivestob, registered 1678: Gules, a martlet between thres cinquafolls argent, within a bordure embattled or. Crest: An antelope's head proper, gorged and attired gules. Motto, "Invia virtuti pervia."
