PREMIER BORDEN TO RETURN NEXT WEEK

Cabinet Will Then Likely Appoint Successor to Hon. Louis Coderre.

OTTAWA, May 21.—Sir Robert Borden is expected back in Ottawa early next week, and all the cabinet will be here, except Mr. Hagen, who has gone to the Adirondacks for rest and quiet, after his operation in Montreal. It is believed that one of the first things to be done will be the resignation of the secretary of state and popular member for Hochelaga.

It is understood that Hon. Louis Coderre is likely to succeed Justice Tupper on the bench in Montreal. The latter has served for many years and is qualified to retire on full salary.

The question of the new French-Canadian member of the cabinet is uncertain. The French-Canadian members of the house of commons will doubtless be allowed to offer suggestions on the matter after discussion among themselves.

SUSPENSION RACE MEETINGS UNLIKELY

Chances Are No Interference Will Come From the Government.

OTTAWA, May 21.—There is no disposition in official circles to think that the Canadian Government will follow the example of the British authorities, who have suspended all race meetings except that at Newmarket. In the British Isles the racing dates are canceled because the railways are needed at all times for speedy movements of soldiers, both going to and coming from the front. In Canada no such situation exists, the railways being able to deal with the military necessities that arise without undue congestion. Racing meets in Canada are not likely, therefore, to be interfered with, unless for some other reason.
