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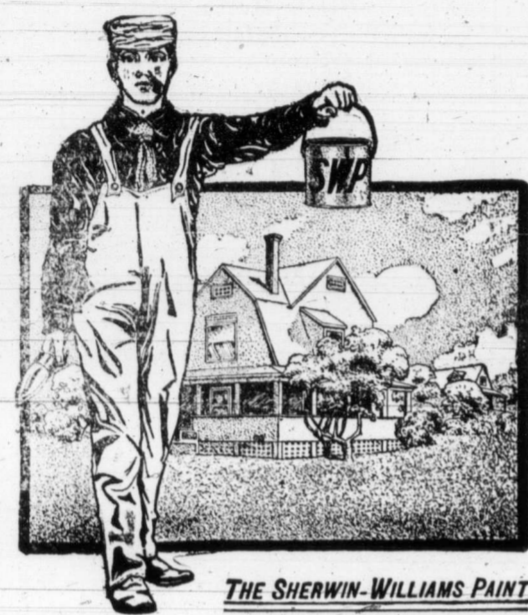

DISASTER ON CENTRAL RY

Train Goes Through Bridge This Morning and Fireman Brand Drowned.

CHIPSAN, May 28.—The train running between Chipsan and Norton on the Central Railway, went through the Washademoak Lake bridge between 7 and 8 o'clock this morning. The train was made up of an engine, two lumber cars and a box car, and it went through the central span of the bridge, plunging into 40 feet of water below, completely submerged the engine. The engineer, Christopher Purdie, made his way out through the cab and succeeded in swimming to shore. The fireman, S. Brand, was drowned. The bridge is said to have been practically a new one, and it cannot be understood here just how it could collapse under the weight of the train. This is the third disaster on that line within a short time.

BOOT AND SHOE COMBINE.

An Effort Being Made Among the Canadian Manufacturers

To Better the Conditions Under Which They Work.

Specialization of Various Branches of the Business a Prominent Feature.

MONTREAL, May 28.—C. R. Johnson, of Toronto and New York, has been in Montreal for some days and the result of his visit may be a combine of all the leading boot and shoe manufacturers in Canada. Mr. Johnson has had considerable success in organizing a furniture trust in the United States, and thinks the boot and shoe manufacturers should protect themselves against the inroads of competitors across the line. Mr. Johnson claims that specializing has become a recognized advantage in all manufacturing. The plan, therefore, is that each firm or company shall take up the manufacture of two or three special lines, while another branch of the association will take up other lines, until among these they will cover the whole gamut of the boot and shoe manufacturing business. Mr. Johnson is a son-in-law of J. D. King, boot and shoe manufacturer of Toronto.

AT ST. JOHN.

Fredericton Boys and the Roses—Alerts Negotiating for U. S. Star Players.

ST. JOHN, May 28.—In consequence of the rain this morning and the threatening weather later on, although this afternoon the sun is bright and the weather all that could be desired, the game between the Roses and the Alerts has been postponed till Thursday next. Bruce McFarlane will then play with the Roses, and will cover the position of right field. Baseball fever is running high here. The Alerts are determined that the Roses, with their strong contingent of Fredericton men, will not get the better of them in the general result this season, and already they are negotiating with United States sporting men for two star players.

YANKEE COMBINES

Hon. Mr. Tarte Says Canada Will Allow No Interference With Its Means of Transport.

MONTREAL, Que., May 28.—At a meeting of the Club Tarte last night, Hon. Mr. Tarte, Minister of Public Works, declared that the Government would never allow Morgan or any other combination of Americans to control the means of transportation in Canada and that if such control was attempted, so far as the Canadian Pacific was concerned, the Government would build another trans-continental railway if it menaced the future of Canada for two generations.

A DIPLOMAT'S OBSEQUIES.

Every Honor Accorded the Remains of Lord Pauncefote by the U. S.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The remains of the late Lord Pauncefote, British Ambassador to Washington, to-day were accorded a national funeral. Every department of the National government was represented and the numerous diplomatic bodies were represented in the persons of the ambassadors, ministers and charges. The presence of a thousand men in arms was the visible sign of military participation in the funeral.

The pall bearers were the German, French, Russian, Mexican and Italian Ambassadors, Secretary Hay, Speaker Henderson and Senator Platt, acting president of the Senate.

The Geologist Survey.

Messrs. Robert Chalmers and R. A. Johnston, of the Geological Survey Department at Ottawa, arrived here at noon today and are registered at the Queen. The N. B. will tomorrow confer the degree of L.L.D. upon Dr. Chalmers for his distinguished services in science and he will return to Ottawa on Friday. Mr. Johnston will remain here for several weeks, making tracings of maps at the Crown Land Office.
