## DECIDED REDUCTION IN OUR MILLING WHEA

Chicago Hears Discouraging Reports From Canadian West-Brokers' Comment.

J. P. Bickell & Co., from Logan and Bryan:

Wheat—There was some hesitation about taking hold of the buying side of wheat this morning around \$1.0%, the same as there was yesterday morning around par. The trade in a way expected a little more reaction than was recorded. It must be apparent to every one that the public is showing a much larger interest in this trade than for some time. The bullish conditions which have been developing and have been apparent to some of the local leaders, are now better understood. Leading local houses had some very bullish returns from inquiries sent out over Canadian northwest, claiming decided reduction in the probable volume of choice millings wheat.


