Thomas V. Johnston was committed as a lunatic. Malcolm McDonald was fined \$50 and costs for one month for being drunk.

An adjournment for a week was made in the case of John Cowan of 27 Elizabeth-street charged with non-support.

A charge of wounding preferred against Raffaele Conelli was dismissed.

Harriet Williams, charged with being disorderly on Rowland-street, was released.

Two brothers, 8 and 11 years old, were charged with breaking into T. G. Crown's grocery store, at 1173 Yonge-street, on Sunday. The younger one was released, and the other was remanded to the Shelter for a week.

**The Pan-American Exposition.**

**Remembered the Charities.**  
Application was made in the Surrogate Court yesterday for probate of the will of the late William Jones, who died on May 15, leaving an estate worth \$14,000, of which \$43,200 is in real estate on Yonge-street, Victoria-street, Wilton-avenue and Elm-street.

Under the will the House of Industry gets \$500, the Protestant Orphan's Home \$300, the Wesleyan Home \$200, Mrs. J. Westler a daughter, is left \$2000, and the son, Robert James Jones, receives the household effects worth \$1000. The residue is divided between Richard Jones, Oakland, Cal.; J. D. Jones of the same place; Samuel Jones, Big Pine, Cal.; and Mary Jane White.

**Is the Hoodie in Honolulu?**  
Honolulu, June 18, via San Francisco, June 26.—It is almost certain that the hooded man, who was seen in the bay from the steamer Alameda, was taken from the ship at this port in fact Marshall Downs has in his possession almost conclusive evidence that such was the case.

**Horses From the Old Land.**  
E. H. Hogate, importer and dealer in Clydesdale and Shire-bred draught horses, leaves for England on Saturday next, after another consignment of horses. Mr. Hogate expects to be back about Aug. 5.

# THE BEST CIRCUS EVER HERE

Managerie the Best, Ring Performance the Best and General Make-Up Was the Best.

THIS IS SAYING A GREAT DEAL.

Trained Seals and Sea Lions, Great Amphibian Wonders, a Unique Feature—At Hamilton To-Day.

Forepaugh & Sells Bros. circus gave exhibition yesterday afternoon and evening at the Baseball Grounds, East Queen-street, and each time had as many spectators as their vast tents would accommodate. Advance notices may have been thought extravagant, but the exhibition fully justifies all that has been said. The street parade in the forenoon was one of the finest ever seen in Toronto, and in some features was unique.

**A First-Class Menagerie.**  
The menagerie first claims attention. It is perhaps the most extensive that ever visited the city, and both children and adults could gain a good deal of useful information by an inspection of the different specimens.

The lions are not of the largest, but are in fine condition. The Bengal tigers are mounted in size, and the leopards, panthers, bears and other savage animals are as good as any seen here and more numerous than usual, usually carried under one management. There are eleven elephants, all fine specimens, and the camels are a welcome lot. There is a large cage of monkeys, and the youngsters divided their time between that and throwing peas at the spectators. The elephants, but the greatest crowds were always to be found where the seals and sea lions were displaying themselves in the large tanks, jumping out at will, and being ordered back by the keepers. They are as docile and playful as dogs and clearly understand the orders of the attendants. Next to the tanks is the great Hippopotamus, and the monster of the Nile called a great deal of attention. There is the rhinoceros, Lilly, who voices little wails, more like a kitten, than a monster, and is usually seen sharpening her horns against the bars of the cage.

**The Ring Performance.**  
The circus performance in the great amphitheatre is of the first performance of every feature. No better tumbling has ever been seen here and the trapeze work is of equal merit. The equestrianism, which is shown in three rings at once, is the acme of daring bareback riding, and the balancing and other specialties on horse back, in the centre of the first order. Mention should be made of the living pictures, which are admirable representations of what one expects to see in sculpture.

**A Wonderful Feature.**  
About the middle of the program the seals are introduced, and their performance is a marvel. First they ring bells, then form themselves into a band and play very well on dumbbells and rings. They are not over tricks. But the climax is capped when the lion of the party "slings" a seal accompanied on a banjo by "Mrs. Tooles," another of the seals. The song is marvelous, if not melodious, and a lion's play has difficulty in making himself heard all over the amphitheatre. As very interesting feature is the feeding of the seals, which appears to be the reverse of doing good work. They catch the fish thrown to them with an expertness worthy of a baseball player, and it was conceded on all hands that the seal show alone is worth the price of admission.

The performing seals have horses as rivals in that line, as showing what training will accomplish.

**Small Army of Clowns.**  
There is a small army of clowns, and some of the best burlesque business ever seen here takes place. The Soo See band is a rich take-out, and the Fitzsimmons-Jeffries fight is another of the funniest affairs that could be imagined.

From the opening parade to the final hippodrome races not a moment is lost, and on leaving the main tent the menagerie, with its clean-cut cages and fine specimens, is again inspected with interest. The show is in Hamilton to-day.

**Great Fight at the Range.**  
At the Long Branch rifle range Sergeant John Hutchinson of the Queen's Own Rifles performed the feat of making the full possible score of 105 points on the regular distances. Seven shots at 200, 500 and 600 yards each were all bulls-eyes, in addition to the long shot of the 1000 yards mark at 200 and 600, were also bulls-eyes, that at 500 being an inner. The rifle used by Sergeant Hutchinson was the Lee-Enfield Government pattern, by Messrs. Jeffrey of London, England.

**Historical Reminiscences.**  
One of the most interesting military relics at the Historical Exhibition is a medal and clasp of the late Colonel John Baldwin, who won for the Peninsular Campaign of 1795-1814, for the following engagements in which he took part:

1. Ortois, in which he received a ball through the arm. 2. Nerva. 3. Nevelle. 4. Erroze. 5. Salamanca. 6. Ciudad Rodrigo. 7. Badajoz, in which, leading the stormers, he was twice thrown from the scaling ladders. 8. Fuentes d'Onor. 9. Busaco. 10. Talavera, in which he was severely wounded in the head.

There is also on exhibition a handsome sword, which was presented to Colonel Baldwin after he came to Canada. At the time of the Rebellion of 1837, Colonel Baldwin was requested by the Governor, Sir George Arthur, to raise a corps for the defence of the frontier. Letter in possession of the colonel's daughters.

On the sword is engraved the following inscription: "Presented to Colonel Baldwin by the Officers of the 6th Provisional Battalion of the Officers of his Regiment for their high respect for him as an officer and strong regard for him as a friend." Toronto, Nov. 6, 1837.

There is also found among these trophies a sash of the colonel's only son, Lieut. Thomas Henry Baldwin, of the 10th Prince of Wales' Royal Canadian Regiment of Foot, who died in 1862 from fever contracted in Gibraltar, whilst on duty. These trophies are loaned by Colonel Baldwin's daughters to the Historical Society.

**At the Board of Trade.**  
The committee appointed at the recent Board of Trade Conference on technical schools will meet this afternoon at the Council Chamber to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock for the purpose of considering measures to carry out the conclusions of the conference.

The council of the Board of Trade will meet to-morrow at 4 p.m.

The grocers' section of the Board held a session yesterday afternoon, the importance to the trade was discussed.

**Sons of Scotland.**  
The 20th session of the Grand Camp Sons of Scotland Benevolent Association meets this morning at the Toronto Hotel. There will be 200 representatives from various camps in Canada. The organization is national and fraternal in its character.

**In Quest of Information.**  
Prof. Harrison of the Ontario Agricultural College will visit Europe for the purpose of collecting information in reference to the latest biological and laboratory methods.

# TORONTO HUMANE SOCIETY

Is Divided in Opinion as to the Best Method of Destroying Dogs.

QUESTION OF HORSE-DOCKING.

Resolution Passed by the Society Thanking the World for its Attitude on This Matter.

The all-absorbing topic at yesterday's meeting of the Toronto Humane Society was: Which is the better way of destroying dogs—the lethal chamber or by the contrivance invented by P.C. Marshall Tripp? The latter system is claimed by many to be far ahead of the former, while others insist stoutly upon the lethal chamber as the quickest and most humane method of putting animals to death.

A discussion on the merits of the respective systems took place, but it was not finally decided which one would be adopted, and the next text of the Tripp invention will be witnessed by a number of members of the society.

**Prefer the Lethal Chamber.**  
Mrs. Charles Grasset spoke strongly in favor of the lethal chamber, and was quoted as saying that Sir Benjamin Ward Richardson, famous for his work and research in anaesthetics, and who invented the system.

Drs. Leslie and McCallum also favored the lethal chamber. Both of them experimented years ago with the other one, and as a result do not favor it.

**Passed by the Force.**  
Mrs. G. G. Wood, Inspectors Stephen and Archibald and Constable Chapman warmly favored the Tripp method, and have declined approval for a horse a horse and claimed should be used entirely.

Rev. Canon Sweeney and others also spoke on the subject, but in view of the conflicting opinions expressed the society decided to wait until a fair test was taken before adopting either system.

Prof. Goldwin Smith, who addressed the meeting, strongly disapproved the cruel practice of docking horse tails. **Thanks to the World.**  
The following vote of thanks was moved by Mr. Robertson and seconded by Dr. McCausland:

Resolved, That this society tender a vote of thanks to the Toronto World newspaper for the editorial published in its issue of the 7th inst., disapproving of the bill now before the House of Commons, which, if carried, would have the effect of legalizing the practice of horse docking, if such a law were enacted it would be a gross insult to the growing humane sentiment of civilization and a retrogression to medieval legislation.

The promoters of the bill, not satisfied with the ruthless custom of docking, have introduced a bill for the purpose of "ringing and nicking" the tail of the horse, apparently with a view of reviving the barbarous fashion that was in vogue more than half a century ago.

In the State of Massachusetts there is a rich anecdote of a man who was a criminal offence, punishable by a fine of two hundred and fifty dollars and a year's imprisonment in the State Prison, for the unenviable notoriety of seeking to make a virtue of this crime by legal means.

For the credit of Canada, it is to be hoped the press generally will denounce the promoters of this bill in their efforts to make the cruelties of fashion do more humane sentiment and outrage common sense.
