

HUNTING BOERS IN HOLES

War Degenerated Into a Chase for the Enemy in Caves in South Africa.

HIDE THERE WHEN BRITISH APPEAR

Three Hundred Prisoners Found Under Ground—Warfare a Tedious Affair.

London, Nov. 21.—The Times prints the following story:

When in November, 1900, while the Atlantic in a hired transport, there was a certain officer on board who was continually trying to damp our martial ardor by expressing his conviction that we should not be in time to see any fighting. He should not be taken in by the light, as we reached Cape Town in June, 1900, when we marched with Lord Methuen into Kromstadt after the occupation of Pretoria, the majority of the force, especially the Yeomanry, were convinced that we were going into the "line" and that the purpose of getting into the line and going home.

Every time for the last six months that we have started out on a fresh march, we have been assured "on the very best authority" that "this is to be our last trek." A sceptic from the very first, I have resolutely refused to be taken in by these "camp lies," and for me the end of the war has always appeared an indefinite distance off. But of late the general aspect of affairs and the attitude of the enemy have undergone such a complete change that, at last, I have brought myself to believe that the end is at hand.

From large, well-organized commandos under the leadership of men of recognized position in the State, the forces of the Boers have divided into small, unmaneuverable bodies led by a few desperate spirits. These small bodies in their turn have dwindled and drifted away until hardly a single commando has a commando worth the name, and the bulk of the remaining forces, the Boers, are now living like rabbits and hiding in caves and holes in the ground, from which they are being pulled out at the rate of several hundred a week by our numerous mobile columns.

The average ignorant Boer has an idea, which his commandant is at pains not to deprive him, that if he should surrender, he will be treated with the utmost leniency in the British camp until all his goods are confiscated, his wife and children banished for life. Rather than risk this, he prefers the chance of remaining in hiding until the Armistice of Mr. Kruger shall have brought the war to a happy conclusion in favor of the Dutch. A few illustrations taken from the recent successful operations in the Magaliesberg Valley may serve to show to what shifts these shamefully misguided men are put.

But first let me point out that nearly all the recent captures have been made from information supplied by burghers who, themselves, are hiding. The burghers, and having found that they are kindly treated by us, have immediately volunteered to reveal the hiding places of others of their fellows. Two men captured by us recently offered to show us where ten others were in hiding. They led us to a place where the river ran between steep, rocky banks, resembling on a small scale an American canon. At first sight the place appeared to be inaccessible to anything but a bird, a goat or a rock rabbit. But some of the men managed to scramble down, and, reaching an overhanging ledge, discovered a cave in the face of the rock. Hidden here, with little food and less ammunition, we found ten ragged men—a remnant of the army which two years ago boasted to drive the British into the sea. They were surprised and surrounded without resistance. During their removal two others began to snipe from quite close by, but not knowing the secret of their hiding-place we failed to have been Queen next June.

FRESH OFFENCE TAKEN.

Chamberlain's Open Letter to Germans Has a Fresh Effect.

Berlin, Nov. 21.—Fresh offence against Mr. Chamberlain, the British Colonial Secretary, has been taken in Germany over an open letter, reproduced here, in which he alludes to the "so-called agitation in Germany, so evidently artificial and entirely based on a misapprehension of the facts," and says that he does not propose to notice it, but that "no sensible German could be affronted by the subject."

The North German Gazette, semi-official, bitterly criticizes the subject of the day denounces Mr. Chamberlain's original utterances at Birmingham as inconsistent and offensive, but considers them to have been modified by the letter. The paper exhorts the army not to be affected or prejudiced into joining the agitation, and deprecates official notice being taken of the unofficial utterances of foreign cabinet ministers.

KILLED BY A COMPANION.

Student at Niagara University Accidentally Shot Yesterday.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Nov. 21.—Joseph O'Shea, twenty-one years old, a student at Niagara University, was accidentally shot and killed by another student near the college grounds today.

A party of students, current, were out for a walk with a rifle, when O'Shea stepped in front of the rifle just as it was discharged. The rifle was in the hands of John Carrigan, 26 years old. The two men were playing a game of hide-and-seek. Carrigan, a month ago from Ireland, to complete their studies for the military. They had spent several years of preparation at St. John's College, Dublin, and both were to have been Queen next June.

QUEEN WIL'S ILLNESS.

Said to Be Due to Frequent Quarrels With Her Husband.

Antwerp, Nov. 21.—The Times Gazette today prints a story to the effect that the illness of Queen Wilhelmina of Holland was the sequel to a series of somewhat serious quarrels with her husband. Several reports of disagreements, due to the Prince Consort's jealousy, cold and severe disposition, have been current, and it is obtained considerable credence. The young Queen inherits all the Orange obstinacy and dislike of criticism and rumors of royal unhappiness started some months back.

HER CONDITION IMPROVED.

Apeldoorn, Holland, Nov. 21.—Altho Queen Wilhelmina has not yet left her room, her condition is improved. The court physician visits Her Majesty only once a day. She is still weak, and requires a great deal of rest. The Queen will probably return to The Hague in a month.

GUARANTEE OF PEACE.

London Times Thus Describes Secretary of State's Recent Speech.

London, Nov. 21.—In an editorial note on the speech delivered by Secretary Hay at the banquet of the New York Chamber of Commerce, on Tuesday evening, The Times says Mr. Hay's remark that the United States seeks the friendship of all the powers, and wants to trade with all peoples, for the profit and advantage of all, is a real guarantee of peace, and is the more likely to be understood in all its bearings, because the United States has now come into contact, as an Imperial power, with some of the problems that have embarrassed the empires of the Old World. It would, says The Times, be difficult to describe more lucidly or more succinctly the policy which a powerful government ought to pursue than by Mr. Hay's words.
