This afternoon, at 2 o'clock, the annual tournament of the Western Ontario Association will open on the greens of the London Rowing Club, with no less than 99 rinks on hand. From Toronto on the east, Windsor on the west, Owen Sound on the north, and St. Thomas and Tilsonburg on the south, the cream of the bowling clubs have come to play for the Labatt trophy, and failing to win that, to try their hands in the consolation or association matches, the singles or doubles.

An even hundred rinks were entered, but at the last moment one was compelled to withdraw. This is five rinks in excess of last year, and will tax the greens of the Rowing Club during the entire week. All of the "old reliables" are on hand again, and fine matches will be the rule.

Mayor Judd will deliver an address

of welcome to the bowlers.

On Saturday night a sub-committee of the bowling association arranged the draw for the trophy match. Dr. Jeff Wood, Ed. Ward and Jim Tiedler were on the committee. DISHABILLE BEAT OUT TOKALON

Crooklyn Handicap Winner Lost at Brighton Beach in a Hard Drive.

New York, July 21.—Dishabille, played down from 2 to 1 to 8 to 5 favorite, won the Islip Handicap, 1 1/8 miles, at Brighton Beach today, defeating Tokalon, winner of the Brooklyn Handicap, with Von Tromp third.

Considering the bad condition of the track, which was sloppy owing to the heavy rain, the time, 1:54, was good. Dishabille, a gelding, was ridden by Ramon Cederstrom, rushed into the lead and showed the way for a quarter of a mile, when Coy Maid took the lead, attended by Dishabille and Tokalon. This was the order to the far turn, Coy Maid maintaining a slight advantage to the stretch, where Tokalon and Dishabille drew away and in a driving finish the favorite won by half a length. Tokalon was second, five lengths in front of Von Tromp.

Ballot, a receding favorite, won the \$7,500 Neptune Stakes, six furlongs. Althous and Don Enrique made the pace to the stretch, when Radke brought Ballot up and won by one length. Ballot carried 125 pounds and conceded eighteen pounds to each of his rivals.

Flying Virginian, played down from 15 to 1 to 8 to 1 at the close, easily won the Curragh Stakes, a steeplechase. He went to the front at the start and making the pace won easily by five lengths. Phantom was second and the odds-on favorite, Patagonian, was third. Gold Coin, Miller up, finished first in the fifth race, but was disqualified for fouling Voladay.

Miller was fined \$100 and suspended for two days by the stewards for rough and reckless riding.

KING'S CUP ARRIVES

New York, July 21.—The King's Cup, the blue ribbon of the year's yachting trophies, presented by King Edward VII. to the New York Yacht Club, will be raced for annually by American yachts, open to the enrolled fleets of all American clubs, arrived at the New York Yacht Club yesterday from England. The cup is of solid gold and valued at over 1,000 guineas. It is finely chased with symbolic figures, emblazoned with a shield bearing its inscription and purpose. It stands fully 10 inches high, exclusive of its base, and measures about twenty inches in diameter.

The cup was received on behalf of the club by Secretary George M. Cornack. Its ownership will be determined in a race off Newport on Aug. 8 in conjunction with the New York Yacht Club cruise.

There promises to be an entry of fully 25 yachts in the race. The largest of these will be the cup defender Vigilant, now converted into a yawl and owned by William B. Iselin.

BOTH PROTESTS WERE DISALLOWED

Eastern League Directors Turn Down Claims of Rochester and Montreal.

Rochester, July 21.—The Eastern League board of directors unanimously decided not to sustain Rochester's protest of the first Rochester-Providence game, played in Providence April 26. Rochester based her protest on the fact that Providence men batted out of order and later returned to the order of the official line-up.

The next case considered by the directors was the protest on the game between Montreal and Jersey City, on April 27, at Jersey City. Montreal protested that Jersey City had a player returned from the game by the umpire and allowed to return to the game and finish it, which Montreal considered unfair, and left the field. The board of directors disallowed the claim.

In deciding the case of the game between Montreal and Rochester that was to have been played on June 1, but was awarded Rochester by Umpires Conahan and Campau, because, owing to trouble over a stolen base, Ramon Cederstrom did not arrive on the field until after time was called, the board of directors decided that the game should go to Montreal, they having won the exhibition game played to take the place of the one forfeited.

President Taylor announced that the decision was based on the fact that according to the statement of the umpire, the game was given to Rochester at three minutes after 4, instead of five minutes after 4, leaving a margin of two minutes in favor of the visiting team.

There were other protests, but all were disallowed. Newark, Toronto and Baltimore were not interested in any protests.

THE CHAMPIONS HANDICAPPED

Toronto, July 22.—Torontos made a runaway finish with the world's champions at Rosedale yesterday. After the score was 5 to 4 in the first part of the last quarter, the locals went at it and put five past the net minder, closing the proceedings with the comfortable majority of 7. This was better than any one expected or even hoped for. Remembering the last two contests, with Montreals and Tecumshes, when Torontos fell down in the last, the crowd looking down for the same old story, "How did they finish?" They finished all right, but not in the usual way. The champs went on the field minus Paddy Brennan, Hobbins and Hogan, though the great Hobbins witnessed the struggle from the clubhouse. Torontos put in Taylor at center and laid off Pete Barnett, and it must be said that Taylor made good. The team was strong from top to bottom, but there were the usual shining stars in Lamoe and Mackenzie, Menary, Lowe and Kalls on home. Richardson played his usual conscientious game, and did his part in giving the game to the home team.

In addition to having to down the great Shamrocks, the Torontos had to beat the referee, Phil Errett, of Ottawa. On one occasion he sent Lowe to the fence after he was sent sprawling on the grass by an opposing player. Errett claimed he did not see who hit Lowe, but penalized Lowe for slashing at the goalkeeper.

Over 5,000 people saw the game and went away satisfied. The locals put up great lacrosse in every department.
