

'LIBERTY SHOES' IN CANADA MAY FOLLOW EXAMPLE OF STATES

Nothing, However, Heard of Proposal By Local Manufacturers.

Shoe manufacturers of the United States, actuated by patriotic motives, have made a proposal to the Government that a Liberty shoe should be introduced. They ask for a strong, durable shoe, appealing in style and quality and which can be sold at a profit at prices paid before the war.

Canadian shoe manufacturers have taken no such steps yet. There were reports some time ago that the Government would order a standard last, but this died down.

One local manufacturer said that the trade feared for a time that the Government intended to carry out its proposal, but said manufacturers hardly think that anything will come of it, now that it has been so long delayed.

"If the United States adopts such a shoe, I don't think Canada will be far behind," stated one local manufacturer. "We have tagged along behind the United States fairly well in certain war measures," he added.

TIME FOR PESSIMISM IS NOT NOW, DECLARES LOCAL STAFF OFFICER

Confidence Should Exist, Says Col. W. J. Brown.

An impressive service was held in Adelaide street Baptist Church Sunday evening, when two honor rolls with over sixty names in all were unveiled by Lieut.-Col. W. J. Brown of the local headquarters staff. Rev. James H. Boyd, in a brief address, introduced the speaker.

Lieut.-Col. Brown gave an address on the war which was much appreciated. "We are passing through the greatest crisis in the history of the world," he said. "While the Germans have been making some headway during the last week, their position is not so good as it was before the battle of the Somme. The enemy apparently attempted to make of this last drive a decisive victory, but the allied armies at the front will never be beaten."

Had Adversity in 1914. Referring to the earlier years of the war, when Germany had the advantage of better equipment, much larger forces of trained men, and with her supremacy at that time in air warfare, the speaker said that that was the time when one might have been led to believe that the Allies were in a much stronger position in every way, there is no possible excuse for pessimism.

The winning of the war depends on putting every available man in the trenches and on the food problem, he said. "The great problem lies with the people at home, and with the men in the front line trenches."

"It is not the fighting which wrecks the men's nerves so much as the long 'night watches,'" he continued. He mentioned the anxiety of the men in the trenches waiting for an attack. One particular instance was given where the strain was so great that the men could not hold up any longer, fired a shot. This started a bombardment which was right, truth and democracy are bound to prevail, he continued.

According to statistics, the British army losses are only 3 per cent during this war, while the normal loss is 1 per cent.

Deputy Sheriff Watterworth stated that many prisoners were being released from the penitentiary for service overseas. Last week three were taken from the prison and attached to the military units. The case of George Marsilio, the confessed burglar, who was sent down for seven years, is now being considered. Men who fight overseas will be pardoned if they return, providing their army record has been satisfactory.

NON-SECTARIAN AT THE FRONT.
To the Editor of The Advertiser: In a recent issue of your paper I observe that the Rev. Father West of St. Thomas raises a legal objection against the courtesy of St. Thomas to a grant from that body to aid the Y.M.C.A. This objection he is to 48 hours. That in addition to the Y.M.C.A. is a sectarian institution.

Doubtless Father West knows conditions in St. Thomas and London better than I do in these places, therefore my remarks do not apply, but I presume the grant in question is for work at the front, and my object in writing is to show that the Y.M.C.A. in its operations at the front is not sectarian, whatever else it is. It might well be said that the Y.M.C.A. is a Roman Catholic institution.

Last Christmas I had charge of the Y.M.C.A. at the front. Both the Roman Catholic and the Anglican divisions were given to the soldiers in camp as a Christmas gift, each soldier getting his choice of anything we had in stock to the value of one franc. Most of them took their share in cigarettes and tobacco. By chance an Irish battalion was in camp that night. They shared equally with the rest. Any Y.M.C.A. worker raising the question of creed in his service to the soldier would at once be regarded as unfit for his job.

While a certain section of the front line was taken over by the Belgians, the British were entirely with the Belgians, all of whom were two weeks before the front. I had the unique experience of living with two Roman Catholic divisions and afterwards helped me in my public gatherings, one playing the piano and the other singing to the audiences. I am sure they were as strong Roman Catholics when we parted as when we first met, and our association had no visible effect upon my Presbyterianism. With these two good friends I am in correspondence.

We also prepared our tents for the celebration of the pasover. Indeed, it would be difficult for the chaplains without the aid of the Y.M.C.A. to carry out their services at the front. Often you see in the same camp and assembly hall, Jews, Mohammedans, Brahmans, Buddhists, and others too numerous to mention, and I have never known anyone on account of his or creed getting preferential treatment. All in the King's uniform received equal treatment and were treated alike. Last year the British Y.M.C.A. spent half a million dollars for the soldiers. Signs such as "The folks at home would like to get a letter from you," hung up in the tent, had a good effect, and often you see the brave man turn to a sign and looks at that sign and says, "Yes, that is so; please give me a paper and envelope. I will do it now." Surely such an organization cannot justly be discriminated against as a sectarian in any way.

As a matter of fact, the men on the front line are not much on sectarian lines, but strong on heroic, vigorous, and practical religion. Their attitude towards religion is well expressed in the words of a great Irishman and loyal Catholic. I use his words without offence to anyone:
"For modes of faith, let graceless zealots fight. His can't be wrong, whose life is in the right."
