London, Feb. 12.—In his speech at the opening of Parliament today, King George said the struggle had reached a critical stage, which demanded more than ever the full use of the country's energies and resources. Until recognition is offered of the only principles on which an honorable peace can be concluded, the King declared, it is the duty of the British to prosecute the war with all the vigor they possess.

ALL GERMANY EXULTS

Withdrawal of the Russians Places Rumanians in Desperate Plight.

London, Feb. 12.—Confirmation of the German report that Russia has with-drawn from the war is contained in an official Russian statement received here

official Russian statement received here today.

The statement says that Russia declares the war with Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey and Bulgaria to have ended, Russian troops simultaneously receiving an order for complete demobilization on all fronts. For the defence of the frontier some detachments of younger soldiers will be left.

Although this announcement was made yesterday in several dispatches from German sources, this is the first word from Russia regarding her withdrawal from the war.

The peace negotiatins with the central powers have been ended, the state-ment says. The Russian delegation re-fused to sign a treaty providing for annexations by Germany. Neverthleless Russia will not continue the war with the Germans and Austrians, "work-men and peasants like ourselves."

BRITISH HOUSE ON LAST LAP OF RECORD SITTING

Session Opening Today Probably Final Before Appeal Is Made to Country.

FIERY DEBATE EXPECTED

Government May Come In For Sharp Criticism From the Opposition Benches.

London, Feb. 12 .- Members of both modern times-a session which is virtually certain to be the last and which will be followed by a general election upon largely-extended franchise, with women voting for the first time in the country's history.

Political circles have been buzzing the past few days with various rumors, showing that severe criticism of the Governhment is to be expected in the debate. One rumor is to the effect that a hostile amendment condemning the Government may be moved from the front Opposition bench.
