AMERICAN SOLDIERS MUST
NOT ATTEND JUAREZ RACES

While in Uniform the Troops Will Not
Be Allowed to Cross the Mexican
Border.

EL PASO, Texas, Dec. 27.—The
Juarez meeting having passed the
early stages, is now entering upon its
fourth week with more than usually
bright prospects. The adoption of the
pari-mutuel system of betting has
proved a big boon, and has been the
means of reviving racing in this
part of the country. The people have
taken kindly to the machines, and
this is reflected in the rapidly in-
creased play since the machines were
first installed.

The meeting is drawing its patron-
age from the civilian population ex-
clusively, as the 50,000 troops now
stationed in or adjacent to El Paso
are prohibited from crossing into Me-
xico while in uniform.

This official order was not aimed
at the race-track, but issued as a
matter of precaution against possi-
ble trouble. Civilians cross the bor-
der to the track every day, without
any thought of molestation by the
Mexican population of Juarez, and
realize that they are just as safe as they
are on the American side.

Everything along the border is calm
and there is absolutely no indication
of any impending trouble.

EDWARD TRICKETT DEAD

Oaraman From Whom Edward Han-
lan Won the Championship.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—News of the
death of Edward Trickett, the noted
Australian sculler, at Uvalde, N. S. W.,
reached here today. Trickett, who
was born in Sydney, N. S. W., was the
first man to win the professional
sculling championship from England
in 1876. In June of that year he
visited England and defeated Joseph
Sadler, the English champion, over
the Thames course, and it was not
until Ernest Barry, the present cham-
pion, defeated Dick Armit in 1912,
that the title was regained for Eng-
land.

Trickett lost the title to Edward
Hanlan, the famous Canadian oars-
man, in 1880, over the Thames course.
