MORE CIGARMAKERS QUIT TUCKETT'S AND JOIN THE STRIKERS

All Find Work in Union Factories.

PICKETS WORK QUIETLY

Police Also Outside Factory, But Everything Is Peaceful.

In addition to the thirty cigarmakers who walked out at the Tuckett Cigar Factory on Clarence street yesterday morning, several more employees decided not to return to work today. The Cigarmakers' Local Union, No. 278, has pickets on duty outside the factory, having posted them there on Monday afternoon. The union also has pickets posted to induce employees to continue their work. About ten female workers, non-members of the union, are also out on strike from the Tuckett factory.

H. G. Ambrose of Hamilton, vice-president of the Tuckett Cigar Company, arrived in London Monday evening in connection with the situation, and he was present with the company pickets on duty this morning shortly after 8 o'clock. He returned to Hamilton on the 9 a.m. train today. Two members of the police force were on duty outside the factory today to prevent unnecessary trouble, summoned, it is said, by the Tuckett Company.

"We are conducting, and intend to conduct, a peaceful picketing here," said Organizer Sullivan of the Cigarmakers' Union, when interviewed by The Advertiser today. "We welcome the police on the job."

It is stated by members of the union that the Tuckett factory is now the only non-union cigar factory in London, and every man who walked out is at work in a local union shop. The men who walked out were strike breakers, a strike having been declared at the Tuckett factory on July 1, 1919. However, as these employees were receiving at Tuckett's \$3 less per thousand for making cigars than the union men, they were not willing to join the union. He stated today that there are 100 vacancies in union shops here for cigarmakers.

When interviewed regarding the labor situation in the Tuckett factory today, A. McFarlane, foreman of the cigarmakers at Tuckett's, said to The Advertiser: "Everything is peaceful and quiet in the factory. Mr. Ambrose is on his way to Hamilton, and I know nothing of his actions here. We have no news whatever to give out."

The local union cigarmakers are quite jubilant over the walkout as it has added numbers to its ranks, and has brought matters to a crucial point at the Tuckett factory. The union has existed since July 1, 1918. In addition, none of the strikers are out of work, being being vaccinated for them in the local union shops. They state that since the Tuckett family sold their interests in the firm there has been continuous trouble in the factories operating under the name of Tuckett. The union has been in existence throughout the Dominion, and this is given as the reason for the great success in building up the trade, under the late owners organized labor being used as a foundation.

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German Acceptance Has Prompt Effect Upon Wall Street

New York, June 23.—News of Germany's unconditional acceptance of the peace terms to Wall Street by way of London around 1:30 p.m., ten or twelve minutes later than the Associated Press flash from Paris, advanced soon.

The stock market hardened immediately, though with little show of activity. Some important stocks rose above the high prices of the opening after their several reactions.
