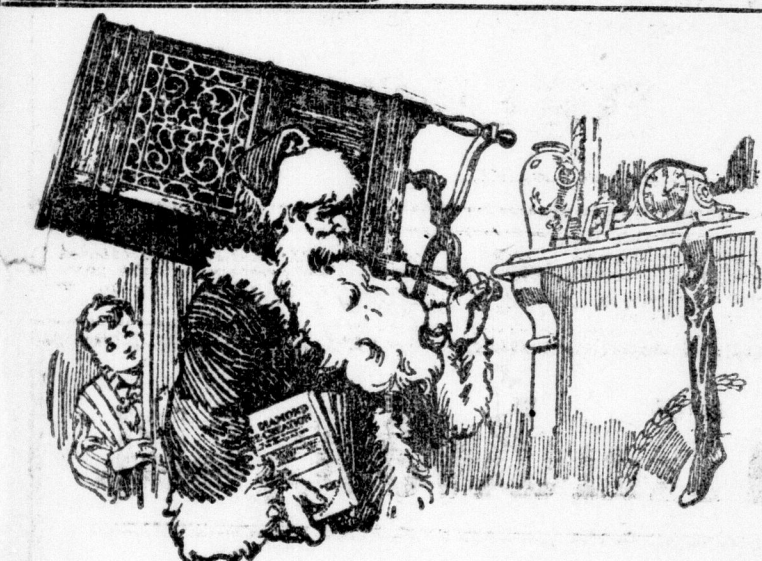

COMMISSIONERS TO ATTEND CONVENTION OF HYDRO DELEGATES

Members of Utilities Board Decide To Interview Premier Drury.

Members of the public utilities commission will all attend the hydro convention in Toronto Friday, December 12, for the purpose of interviewing Premier Drury, they decided at the regular meeting Thursday afternoon. Although no arrangement for a meeting to precede the interview with the premier is included in the invitation which the commission received, the members presume that such will be the case.

In that event they will not support any motion to make Sir Adam Beck permanent chairman of the hydro-electric commission. They will urge that any representation made to the premier deal entirely with the office and not with Sir Adam Beck or any other individual. They stated at the meeting that they would advocate the chairman of the hydro commission holding office for six years, while the other two commissioners would be in office four years.

They will advocate that one of these commissioners be appointed by the Government, to hold office for the next two years, while a commissioner elected by the hydro municipalities holds office for four years. When the term of the Government appointee ends, his successor will hold office for four years. This plan would insulate the commission from the terms of both commissioners will not both terminate at once and will always leave an experienced member on the commission.

No intention of Permanent Chairman. Chairman Philip Pocock said the commissioners should attend the convention, as it was merely a matter of looking after their own property. He said there was no intention of making Sir Adam Beck permanent chairman of the hydro commission. He was advocated as chairman for a number of years, but not for a lifetime. The suggestion was merely in accordance with the practice followed on the railway board.

Commissioner Jared Vining pointed out that there was no provision for recall in the event of a chairman proving a failure. At the same time he believed that the commission could not get a better chairman than it had at present. He did not think the hydro delegates should suggest him or anyone else in connection for the office. They should merely make their suggestions in regard to the terms of office for the commissioners and chairman.

Mayor Somerville asked how the municipalities' commissioner would be elected.

Chairman Pocock replied that each municipality had vote according to the power it used. No municipality
