**NEW INSURANCE BILL** Modifications Made in Respect to Limitations as to Investments.

OTTAWA. Feb. 23.—It is expected that Hon. Mr. Fielding will bring down in the commons in a few days the insurance bill as devised according to suggestions made by the committee of the house which had the original draft of the bill under consideration last session.

While the chief features of the bill have been retained in the redrafted measure in respect to the provisions for securing more readable and detailed reports by insurance companies to the government as to details of investments of funds, it is understood that there has been some modification of the provisions specifying the class of securities in which these funds may be invested.

The chief objections raised by the companies to the bill of last year were with respect to undue restrictions as to investment of funds.
