CURRENT SPORTING GOSSIP

NOW THAT THE MUCH-TOUTED MOIR has been captured, London fans can settle down to solid baseball and athletic talk once more.

THE REMAINDER OF THIS week promises to be a busy one for local sportsmen, for there are all manner of athletic events on tap. Today and tomorrow a few Birdlets tackle the Brooklyn Giants. Tonight the Midget basketball team of this city tackle the Swapiaks. Hamilton City League champions, on the "Y" gym floor, and earlier in the evening the junior athletes of the "Y" will hold a twilight track meet at Queen's Park.

Friday and Saturday Niagara Falls will be here for ball games with the local pros, and Saturday afternoon at 8.30 the big athletic meet of the London A. A. will be held at the park.

AT A SACRIFICE of a considerable sum Manager Vreath, of the Birdlets, has agreed to help local sports along by calling Saturday's game with Niagara Falls at 2 p.m. in order to allow those who care to do so to attend the races at Queen's Park. Cars will be waiting for the fans, and they should be able to get out there in time for the first race. The East End League officials have also kindly agreed to play but one game, and to call that at 8 p.m.

A PITTSBURGH ALDERMAN has written an anonymous letter to the Smoky City council in which he severely criticizes President Garney Dreyfuss. Among other things he insinuates that baseball of the present day is a crying monopoly in which the public is "buncoed" into paying exorbitant prices for an inferior article of amusement, and that Barney's howl about the tax the city fathers imposed is a bit of brazen-faced whimping. Evidently, Dreyfuss overlooked the formality of sending this politician enough season tickets. Perhaps he is one of the new narrow-gauge politicians, who hates to see anyone make money but himself.

CHRISTY MATHEWSON stands out prominently as the leading pitcher of the season in the big leagues. McGraw's star has won six straight games, of which two were shutouts. He has struck out thirty-two batsmen—more than fifty per game. Matty has allowed but three-five hits, has pitched one one-hit game and one four-hit contest.

TODAY MR. BRENT, of the local Y. M. C. A., received word from Kerr, champion sprinter of Canada, asking for entry blanks to the Olympic trials in London on Saturday next. Kerr is one of the best boys in the world in 100 and 220 yard dashes, and with Ralph Brown, and other fast Hamilton and Toronto sprinters to go against him he should be compelled to travel in record form if he would win.

THE CENTRAL Y. M. C. A., of Toronto, will also send many of its crack athletes here to compete, and Claude Pearce, the holder of the Hamilton to Toronto record of 7 hours and 29 minutes, will have to step to win the ten-mile race. W. H. Wood, the clever Brantford distance man will also be a competitor in the ten-mile run. Wood, it will be remembered, won the Woodstock to Ingersoll road race, and came second in the Hamilton road race.

HOWEVER, IN LOOKING OVER THE ENTRIES the local runners and sprinters must not be overlooked. In Mel Brock, London has one of the best half-milers in Canada, while in the

sprints Jack Sweeney is always some where around the medals at the finish.

JACK POLINSBEE and his brother Maurice, too, must be given some consideration, for between them they have held the all round championship of Western University for several years. Both are good sprinters, and are always in the best of trim.

IN THE JUNIOR RACES the entries will be the classiest of their kind in local athletic history, and to the local Y. M. C. A. is this chiefly due, for the boys' classes there have developed many number of splendid little runners and jumpers.

THE LONDON COLLEGIATE will not be far behind, either, in the matter of entries for the junior races, and taken altogether the entire meet should be the best ever held in London, not excluding the ill-fated Irish-Canadian electric light meet.

KING EDWARD has taken a sudden dislike to the hold-up methods of Tommy Burns, and he announced that that Terry is right, and Terry will go to Philadelphia for the trial bout. This will come off next Saturday, and to show that confidence in Terry's wallop isn't waning, Humphreys has matched him against Young Loughrey, one of the toughest of Philadelphia's lightweights.

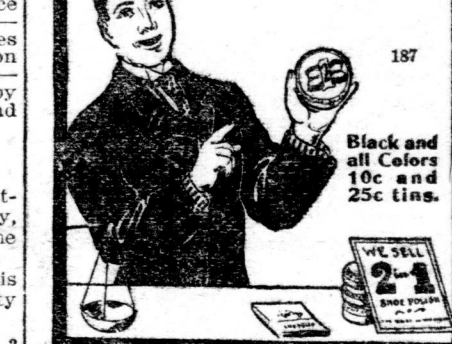
