NEWS FROM NORTH END.

The Tapley Raft.

An effort is being made by Tapley Bros., to get out the large raft that was frozen in at Grumot last fall. (Gaspard L. Tapley has gone ahead with a crew of men, and orders have been issued to Captain Milton Belen of the tug "Sea King" to leave Indiantown with his boat this afternoon, and proceed up river as far as possible, and await the breaking up of the ice. It is believed that she will hardly get beyond "Devil's Back", as the ice at that point is sufficiently strong to admit of driving.

In Portland Methodist.

There was a large congregation in Portland Methodist church, last night. Many were drawn by the announcement that Evangelist Shaver would undertake to prove that every one has broken each and all of the ten Commandments. His sermon was necessarily long, but it was listened to throughout with the closest attention. It was a clear and forcible exposition of the meaning, scope, and purpose of the moral law. The preacher proceeded to show that the law was "exceeding broad" and deep in its spiritual application. One by one he took up the Commandments and showed how they took cognizance, not only of the outward physical act, but also of the "thoughts and intents" of the soul.

There were many present who were willing to acknowledge that they had broken some of the Commandments, but who could not see how they had violated all of them. Indeed they were ready to resent the very suggestion that they had not kept most of them. "There are none so blind as those who won't see," and those persons must have been willfully blind indeed if they did not see that the preacher had made out a clear case against them. The surprising thing was that those Commandments which we fondly thought we had kept the very ones which, as interpreted by Christ, we had most certainly broken.

On the River.

Ice is running through Indiantown harbor in great quantities today. The covers and bays along the river are now open, and it is from them that the ice is coming. The Long Reach is yet solid, and until it breaks up, navigation will not open. The river is clear at Grand Bay, and the ice will probably move out from Baywater by tomorrow.

At Gondola Point, on the Kennebec, driving is now impossible. The ice is rotting fast there.

The steamer Elaine will make her first trip up river, on Saturday April 15th. She will endeavor to reach Gagetown.

James Holly left this morning on board the tug Seron E., to inspect the river. The tug will go up river as far as possible. On Tuesday the tug Sea King will leave for Fredericton, and will endeavor to bring down part of the Fredericton boom.

LIQUOR LICENSES. BROKE, IN ST. JOHN.

Evangelical Alliance Will Try to Prevent Many Dealers Getting a Renewal.

Seventeen St. John liquor saloons will have to close their doors, if the action of the Evangelical Alliance is sustained.

The Alliance has taken definite action with reference to the renewal of the liquor licenses, who have been found guilty of violation of the act during the past license year.

The executive of the Alliance held a conference with Inspector J. B. Jones yesterday afternoon and, on behalf of the Alliance, they entered a formal protest against the granting of renewals to M. A. Harding, James McLaughlin, Robert Garrett, William Caples, Thomas Driscoll, Edward Hogan, Chas. J. Lannan, James McCarthy, James Driscoll of the Edgely Hotel, Chas. Danery of the Park Hotel, W. H. McQuade of the Grand Union, D. W. McCornick of the Victoria, James Ryan.

In addition they protested against renewals being granted to Thomas Driscoll, Howard Hogan, J. A. Lane, Peter J. Dolan.

All these are on Union street, and the protest was made because these are in excess of the number allowed by law to the locality.

They further protested against licenses being issued to M. A. Harding owing to the proximity of his premises to the main street.

Inspector Jones informed the Times today, that as a result of yesterday's conference, a number of decisions had been served with notices, informing them that they had been appointed to deal with the epidemic of cerebro-spinal meningitis said last night that he did not consider the situation as alarming, the percentage of deaths from meningitis, when compared with those of other diseases, not being large.

The deaths from meningitis for the past six days were 96 against 181 deaths in the previous week.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP.

Mayor-Elect Dunne Will Carry Out His Chicago Programme.

New York, April 7—Fresh from his triumph in the municipal election, Mayor-elect Edward F. Dunne, of Chicago, came to New York today and tonight addressed a large meeting in Cooper Union under the auspices of the Municipal ownership league in this city. He told his hearers how he expected to carry out his pledges made in his recent campaign in Chicago, to attain municipal ownership of the benefits, as he conceived them, of the control of public utilities and the city control of the local economy.

Recent agitation in New York for municipal ownership added interest to Judge Dunne's utterances.

A ROYAL HOLIDAY.

King Edward and Queen Alexandra Leave Marseilles Today.

Marseilles, April 8.—It is expected that the British Royal Yacht Victoria and Albert, with King Edward and Queen Alexandra on board, will sail this afternoon, although a violent storm in the Mediterranean may delay her departure.

The first stop of the yacht will be at Port Maon, Island of Minorca. Her ultimate destination has not been disclosed, but the fact that Port Maon, Morocco, gives rise to reports that King Edward may stop at that port. The officers of the yacht re-

SEVERAL BILLS RECOMMENDED.

Fredericton, April 8.—The municipal committee this morning agreed to the bill authorizing the extension of the fire, water and light limits of the city of Fredericton, and to spend \$20,000 in the proposed extensions; also to install a sewerage system, and to issue \$20,000 bonds to pay floating indebtedness. A bill to pay certain precautions to maintain the purity of the water supply. The law committee recommended a bill relating to the election of trustees of the First Baptist church, Moncton. Rev. Charles Legel and Rev. Richard Sloggett were recommended for authorization to solemnize matrimony.
