MUST DEVELOP HER MINERAL RESOURCES

Warning to United States That Otherwise Shortage of War Material Will Be Faced

St. Louis, Oct. 9.—The United States will face a grave scarcity of minerals necessary to the conduct of the war unless the vast mineral deposits of the

country are amply developed, said W. G. Westervelt of New York, chairman of the United States war minerals board in an address here today. Nitrates, essential to the manufacture of powder and high explosives, are imported from South America, he said, because of the shortage of ships. Manganese, a mineral used in hardening steel, he said, is imported at the expense of other necessary articles, while vast deposits of the mineral in Virginia, Arkansas and California are under-developed.

He added that steps also must be taken at once to insure a sufficient supply of lead, tin, mercury, mica and zinc necessary to the successful prosecution of the war.

CANADA MUST GIVE UP MORE LUXURIES

Why Britain Is Buying Less In Dominion

Extravagance In Imports

Money so Sent Out of Canada Means so Much Less Available for Beating the Huns—The War Outlook

(Special Cable to Times by F. A. McKenzie)

Brighton, Eng., Oct. 9.—Eminent British financial authorities assure me that the real inwardness of the recent marked reduction of imperial purchases of Canadian products and munitions is solely financial. Britain requires vast quantities more urgently than ever, but is forced to make purchases from countries like the United States when the cost can be met by local loans and advances. Canada has been unable to do this, and her inability is largely due, say authorities here, to the fact that she continues to permit large sums to leave the Dominion to pay for imported luxuries.

It became necessary this summer to send gold to Canada to meet a balance on imperial purchases there. It is urged that Canada should adopt the same severe self-denying financial measures against imported luxuries, which Britain is enforcing so successfully. "England has by strict regulations stopped importation of almost everything save absolute necessities for the civil service," said one high authority. "This compels the prosperous classes to limit their purchases, giving them unpendable surpluses available for government loans. Canada, by arresting importation of one article alone—automobiles—preventing use of all automobiles for pleasure riding as England has done would automatically make many millions of dollars available for war use."

"You cannot spend upon imported luxuries and also have the same money available for war use. Every thousand dollars spent outside the Dominion for unnecessary luxuries is a thousand dollars less for beating the Huns. The money thus saved subscribed in Dominion loans or bank advances can be used by the imperial authorities to pay for Canadian products and munitions."

"This war is becoming more an issue between financial resources. We have many months of vast expenditure ahead. Will Canada use the heights of financial sacrifice corresponding to her magnificent military powers?"

Supplementing this statement from an authority whose name, were I allowed give it, would command universal respect, I desire to add that every day now strengthens the belief that the war is not yet approaching an end. I recently made a thorough investigation of the German food position, and the facts showed that the German bread supply is materially improving. They have exploited prison labor to raise enormous crops from Serbia, Roumania and Poland. Forty-three per cent. more Serbian land was under cultivation this year than during the best peace days.

Germany has suffered very severely indeed from lack of food, but internal supplies now seem to be better. Elimination of Russian and serious lighting factor enabled large concentration of troops in Flanders—young, sturdy men, well supplied with munitions. We today are face to face with an enemy still enormously strong, still unconquered. Our summer campaign, despite many brilliant victories, failed to realize our hopes. This was due to the two main causes, Nivelle's costly summer attack, which arrested the French offensive, and the heavy August and September rains, checking our Flanders advance.

Our maximum advance cannot come until next spring, when the American army will enable France to renew her offensive co-operation with ourselves. During this time of waiting, every financial and man power resource of the allies must be accumulated. British losses alone in September totalled 2,938 officers and 100,200 men. The enemy army and civilian population is weakening under the strain, but their racial discipline will almost certainly carry them over until next spring. We are faced now by a situation demanding sacrifices from all parts of the empire, surpassing anything yet imagined, if our ideals are to be attained.

Thousand Men at New York Docks Go Out Without Apparent Grievances

New York, Oct. 9.—Intimations that a strike of 1,000 longshoremen employed

Mr. Raymond declared the cause of the strike was a mystery to him, and asserted that he believed sinister influences were responsible for it.


Gates leading to the piers have been securely locked, the guards have been doubled and watchmen have been ordered to take extraordinary precautions.
