

64TH BATTALION GOES TO HALIFAX

Eight Recruits Signed for 104th on Saturday

MEETING IN IMPERIAL

W. S. Fisher Tells of Visit to England and Judge Carleton Heard in Stirring Appeal—News of the Soldiers

As forecasted several days ago in the Times the 64th Battalion is to be sent to Halifax for the winter. Despite repeated assertions from Ottawa that the unit was to be quartered here, it is learned from an authentic source that it is to be taken to Halifax, where there are now two other infantry battalions, together with artillery, naval attaches and men of other units. The New Brunswick men in the 64th are to be transferred to the 104th.

Rev. and Hon. Capt. J. J. McCaskill, 73rd battalion is in the city on a short visit from Valcartier.

The Honor Roll

Seven men were accepted for service at the Mill street offices on Saturday, while an eighth signed, but has not yet been accepted. The volunteers were: William Donnelly, St. John; William Henry Price, Moss Glen, Kings county; James Nixon, St. John; Charles Weatherhead, St. John; Thomas Phillips, London, England; Frank Wood, St. John; And one other whose name was not disclosed.

At the Congregational church: Napoleon Joseph Landry, of Gardner (Me.), of Canadian recruiting rooms.

As usual the smoker and recruiting meeting at the rooms, corner of Mill and Union streets on Saturday night was marked by bursts of applause as young men passed up stairs to be examined by the medical officer as to their fitness for overseas service. An orchestra of five pieces provided the music. Lieutenant Peters occupied the chair, and short speeches were made by A. H. Wetmore, M. E. Agar, Mayor Frink, Lieut. Black and A. M. Belding. These meetings are continued every night. One man who was present Saturday evening to be examined was accompanied by his wife.

Sunday Meeting

Last night the Imperial Theatre was again the scene of a large gathering for what are now the regular recruiting rallies. Dr. W. W. White presided and the speakers were W. S. Fisher and Judge Carleton, of Woodstock. During the evening, Miss Val de Fontenay very nicely sang a solo, "His Majesty the King," for which Miss Beryl Blanch played the accompaniment.

Mr. Fisher gave an interesting and graphic description of recent events in England, serving of local concern. He said that the feeling in England was one of buoyant confidence in the ultimate triumph of the allies, but more men were needed to attain success. He and Mrs. Fisher had visited their son Lieut. Don Fisher who had been wounded and told of the excellence of hospital attendance and the systematic manner in which the details of caring for the soldiers are executed.

Judge Carleton, of Woodstock, N. B., spoke of the justice of the war and paid tribute to the glory of British arms and navy. He told of the several times when British had been threatened, but the watchfulness of the British navy had been her safeguard.

Six Travelers Sign.

The commercial travelers held a meeting in the board of trade on Saturday night to open the list for recruits for the commercial travelers' company of the 104th battalion. The following men were the first to sign the roll: J. Turnbull, A. C. Tanner, J. V. Keirstead, W. R. Wilson, J. F. Whitley and M. J. Mulaney.

The chairman of the committee stated that these men would not have to give up their work until Dec. 2. Strong speeches were delivered by J. V. Keirstead, A. Knapton, J. LeLachur, J. Knight, F. W. Coombs, J. Turnbull and the chairman. About forty members were present.

Another meeting will be held in the board of trade rooms Saturday evening at 8 o'clock when Lieutenant Colonel Fowler will give an address. There will be a recruiting rally this evening at 8 o'clock in the Commercial Hotel. The speakers will be Rev. Dr. Hutchison, Commissioner Potts and D. Mullin, K.C.

Four hands will parade on Thursday evening from different parts of the city to one of the local banks on Thursday night at which Lieut. Col. Fowler, Sergt. Norman Knight and others will speak.

A farewell dinner was tendered to Colonel Paul R. Hanson formerly of St. John by friends. The dinner was given in the Engineers' Club. He is soon to leave for London to join the Canadian Headquarters Staff.

Charles Kenney, of St. John, N. B., has been interned in Ruthven Camp, Germany, having been taken a prisoner some time ago.

Voluntary System Succeeds

The Earl of Derby in London on Saturday said that his plan of getting recruits by the voluntary system had been successful, and conscription, he thought, would not be necessary.

A letter from Gunner Harry Pike, a member of the heavy artillery under Major Massie, recently tells of his being still in good health. He has been in France and at the front since leaving England, and has seen some spirited action.

BAPTIST RESOLUTION ON MATTERS AFFECTING WINTERING OF TROOPS

At the United Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, held in Truro recently, the following resolution was passed:

"Whereas the quartering of Canadian troops in large centres means that temptations to intemperance and immorality are greater; and whereas many anxious parents, unwilling to see their sons exposed to such dangers, are holding them back from enlistment; and whereas many of the men composing Canada's volunteer army have already shown that they do give way to such temptations."

"Therefore be it resolved that we petition the military authorities and most earnestly request as follows:

1.—That our troops be not quartered in the large centres.
2.—That wherever they may be quartered, there may be prohibition for an area of at least ten miles in each direction from the encampment.
3.—That the military authorities co-operate with the civil authorities in the enforcement of law against all kinds of vice.
4.—That in the selection of military of all ages and for grown-ups plainly on the moral qualifications of applicants.
Copies of this resolution were ordered sent to the leading maritime papers and to the premier and minister of militia.

REDUCE DIVISION OF "PROTESTANT CHRISTENDOM"

Reference in Report at National Council of Congregational Churches in United States

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 28.—At the International Council of Congregational Churches here Rev. William H. Ward reported on the movement toward union with other denominations, saying that a plan of union with the United Brethren and the Methodist Protestants, which has been accepted by a majority of their local conferences, seemed almost certain of adoption at their forthcoming general conference.

The report further said: "Organic union is a world movement. In the mission fields union is making rapid progress. It has come to be the rule that kindred denominations working in any country must unite their churches into one national body. The existence of

present of over 100 denominations is not creditable to American Protestantism. This gives a sting to every criticism by the Roman Catholic Church. Surely it is time for Congregationalists to do their part in reducing the divisions of Protestant Christendom."
