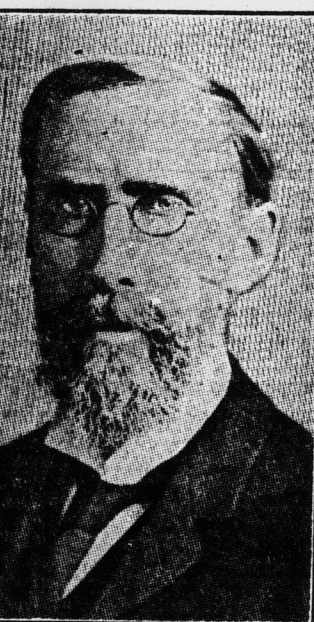

#### THE PORTS' NEEDS.

To the Editor of The Times-Star:—It is a pity that in a late copy of the Saint John Telegraph-Journal that two Maritime men, Mr. D. C. Congdon, of Dartmouth, and Mr. D. F. Maxwell, of Saint Stephen, have defended the Maritimes against the misrepresentations appearing in a recent issue of the Saturday Night.

Our port is our only remaining asset, and our whole future depends upon whether it is developed or allowed to remain in its present condition.

If developed and used as a winter port by our government railways, Saint John will become large and prosperous. Every steamer coming here spends about \$5,000 in the city; this money is put into immediate circulation and benefits everybody.

As pointed out by Mr. Maxwell, grain can be hauled from Winnipeg to Saint John cheaper than from Winnipeg to Portland. The latter city is prospering because our grain is carried to its port instead of ours—and carried by our own railway.

The Government entered into an agreement with the city and the C. F. R. to make certain improvements at West Saint John. It promised to begin improvements at East Saint John by building two wharves at Courtenay Bay, but these promises were never carried out.

Possibly a commission will now be appointed to inquire into our needs, but it will mean only waste of time. For our own preservation we must have action. If Saint John is to be the winter port of Canada, work must begin at once in order that we may be able to handle the business next season.

If the Government does not begin work immediately, it does not intend to do anything for us. ## SWEDEN'S LIQUOR CZAR NOW POPULAR

Dr. Bratt, Once Butt of Jokes,  
Now Treated With  
Great Respect

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 10.—Wet sentiment in Sweden has completely changed with regard to Dr. Bratt, the country's liquor czar, since his system of individual rationing first went into effect ten years ago.

At first he was the butt of most vaudeville jokes and the favorite subject for ridicule in the comic press, including the daily paper "Veckan." Today the same elements treat him almost with veneration, considering him to be their savior from prohibition.

Among the total abstinence advocates the situation is, naturally, the reverse. In a countrywide picnic on prohibition three years ago, the vote was won by two per cent after their main plan had been to maintain all private profits by strictly limiting all private profits in the liquor traffic to a low percentage on the capital invested. The Bratt system not only restricts the purchase of each family to a definite amount, never more than a quart a week, but also collects for the government a mere \$25,000,000 in liquor taxes each year.
