Canadian Secretary Disagrees With Proposed "Hands Off" Policy

OTTAWA, Ont., May 8.—At a meeting of the local Trade and Labor Council last night, when a debate was in progress as to the advisability of supplementing the action of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada by sending a cable pledging the council's moral support to the strikers in Great Britain, P. M. Draper, Dominion secretary, stated the position of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada in relation to the general strike.

## TEACHERS FOR PLAYGROUNDS NOT YET NAMED

Association Considering Applications—Sum Voted for Shelter in West End

The appointment of teachers for the six supervised playgrounds to be conducted this summer was considered by the members at the meeting of the Playgrounds Association yesterday afternoon in the Health Centre but definite action was deferred for a short while.

There were very many applications received and the qualifications of the women applicants were considered by the women members of the board at an earlier meeting, held at the residence of Mrs. George Dishart, while the men members considered the qualifications of the men applicants at a committee meeting in the Health Centre.

It is intended to have one supervisor, one male instructor and one student teacher as a play leader, for each of the six grounds and the student teachers will receive half the salary that was given to the assistants at the grounds in previous years.

P. J. Lewis, the president, was in the chair for the opening of the association meeting and when he was called away J. H. Hamilton presided.

Mr. Hamilton reported for the committee which had looked into the needs of the grounds on the west side which were damaged by fire in the burning of the old city hall building in Charleston. The sum of \$200 was voted for erecting a shelter and making necessary repairs on those grounds.

A committee consisting of Mr. Lewis, Mr. Hamilton and R. Parker Hann was appointed to wait on the School Board to obtain permission to use the grounds and one room in the school buildings where school property is required for the playgrounds.

Mrs. Dishart submitted a very satisfactory statement of the finances and Miss Emma J. Heffer, supervisor, reported on the closing of the season at the East End Boys' Club and was granted a holiday period before the opening of the playgrounds season. There were many expressions of appreciation of Miss Heffer's work.

## Eighty Millions In Theatre Deal

NEW YORK, May 8.—A theatrical merger involving \$80,000,000, through which the Stanley Company of America has acquired control of 225 theatres in seven Eastern States is announced by the Mark Strand Theatre Corporation, one of the four companies included.

In addition to the Mark Strand chain of theatres in New York State and New England, the Stanley Company has acquired the Fabian Circuit Theatre in New Jersey and the chain owned by Rowland & Clark of Pittsburgh. The merger gives the Stanley Company control of theatres in Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and Washington, D. C.

### DISARMAMENT NOT AFFECTED BY STRIKE

British Delegates to Fly to Paris on Way to Geneva Meeting

LONDON, May 8.—The British Government's interest in strengthening the League of Nations and bringing about European disarmament, will not suffer interference because of the general strike.

Lord Robert Cecil and Sir Cecil Hurst, chief delegates of the commission to study the composition of the League Council, will fly to Paris today enroute to Geneva for the first meeting of the commission.

Lord Cecil will remain for the preliminary disarmament conference May 18 at which Soviet Russia is the only large state not represented.

## RESTRICT SELLING OF FRENCH FRANC

Trading on Margin Has Been Prohibited, Finance Minister Reports

PARIS, May 8.—Finance Minister Peret yesterday announced that measures had been taken to restrict the selling of francs. Trading in the Bourse on margin had been prohibited and it has been made obligatory that all buyers and sellers of foreign

currency must declare the names of the nationality and residence before effecting transactions.

Exchange offices which have been operating without authority, have been closed throughout France by a Government order, M. Peret said.

"The Bank of France has not had to intervene in the franc situation," M. Peret said. "The market did not go badly today. This is merely a passing crisis which is due to foreign influence."

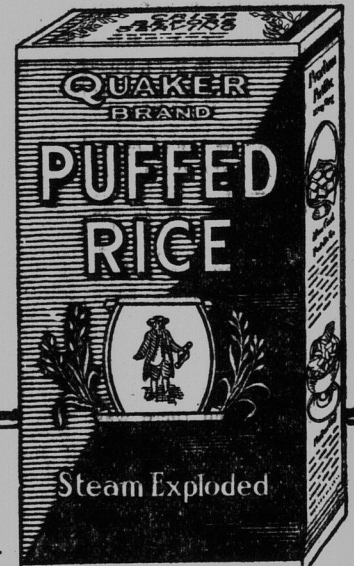
