RIGHT OF GARLAND OR FORKE TO SPEAK FOR PARTY SPURNED

Statements of 2 Reputed by Progressive From Alberta

LIBERALS ACCUSED OF CLOUDING ISSUE

Real Facts of Scandal in Customs Too Horrible For Public Debate

WINNIPEG, July 8.—Denial of the right of E. J. Garland (Bow River) or Robert Forke (Brandon) to speak for the Progressive group as a whole, was made in a signed statement today by W. T. Lucas, Progressive, Camrose, Alberta.

"I have read with interest the statements issued by E. J. Garland and Robert Forke. I take the position that neither of these gentlemen has any authority to speak for the Progressive group as a whole, and the statements referred to are simply explanations of members based on certain interpretation of what took place during the last few days at Ottawa.

VIEW OF 5 UNEXPLAINED.

"These statements, I feel confident, do not explain the views of at least five members of the Progressive group, Mr. Garland and Mr. Forke both deny that the Progressive members have any assurance that they would support Mr. Melgion to speed up the work of the session and pass the legislation which had already reached the Senate and which was of such importance to the west.

"If no such promise was given why it may be asked, did Mr. Forke visit the Governor-General at all? Why was the memorandum prepared; why was it passed unanimously by the Progressive group in conference; why did the members of the group sustain the Melgion administration on at least two divisions prior to the vote on the legislative question? I may be mistaken, but it would seem that the Progressive group is simply a smoke screen created by the Liberal party and its defenders to belude the real issue.

ISSUE IS SCANDAL.

"The issue before the people is undoubtedly that of the customs scandal. When the real facts are known this scandal will be disclosed as one of the worst that has ever besmirched the public life of this country. Indeed, the details are too horrible to permit of discussion from the public platform, but some means must be found to convey to the electors the truth with respect to the conditions as they existed prior to the action taken by the Hon. H. H. Stevens.

KENNEDY FRAISED.

"I have nothing but the most profound admiration for Mr. Kennedy, of Peace River, the Progressive representative on the committee of inquiry. Mr. Kennedy, knowing the facts, voted for the censure of the government against the majority of his own group, although they had previously decided at caucus to support him until the King government. Just why they changed their minds is something that Mr. Forke and Mr. Garland have yet to explain."

\$1,000,000 LOSS IN TAXI FIRM LIKELY

Small Stockholders Are Hit Hard in Bankruptcy at Chicago

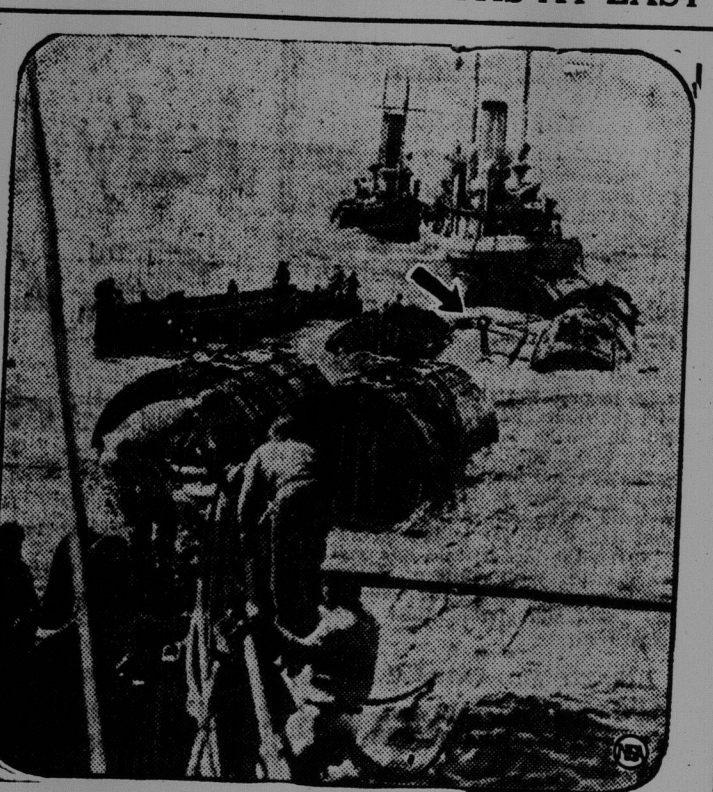
CHICAGO, July 8.—A possible million dollar loss of stockholders of moderate income was indicated today by investigators delving into the crash of the Premier Taxi Cab Company. A creditors' petition made the basis for a bankruptcy order yesterday placed the company's liabilities at \$1,000,000 and the assets at \$1,000,000, but study of the firm's books led Receiver Samuel Howard to the opinion that little more than \$200,000 could be salvaged from the firm.

Even the meters of upwards of 700 cabs, listed as chief assets, were found to be heavily mortgaged and the receiver said that there was no possibility that the company would resume operations under court supervision. Investigators found that hundreds of small investors were interested in the cab firm. Sale of the company's stock was ordered stopped by the Illinois Securities Commission last April because of failure to supply a supplementary report.

Fire In Mt. Allison Buildings; Disaster Narrowly Averted

Roy Ward, in Fighting Flames on Roof of Gymnasium, Falls to Ground and is Rendered Unconscious

SACKVILLE, July 8.—A conflagration was narrowly averted yesterday when the roofs of the Mount Allison Academy, gymnasium and barn caught fire. Apparently the blaze originated from sparks blowing up from a rubbish fire built by a crew of men working on the railroad nearby. The fire started on the roof of the gym and while endeavoring to extinguish the blaze, Roy Ward received a severe shaking up, and when he slipped on the wet roof and fell from the building. He was picked up unconscious, but fortunately no bones were broken. The firemen were soon on the scene and extinguished the blaze.

ST. STEPHEN SCHOOL TO BE REMODELLED

Almer Nesbitt is Successful Tenderer For Job at \$20,560

ST. STEPHEN, July 8.—At a meeting of the Board of School Trustees yesterday afternoon tenders for the remodeling of the Marks street brick school were opened. There were three complete tenders, 4 being from local firms, and the lowest was Almer Nesbitt, whose figure was \$20,560. This amount covers the work complete excepting only whatever new desks and seats are required.

The building will contain one more class room than at present, and will give the town a school building, modern in every respect.

MISS M'PHAIL CALLS BISAILLON RASCAL IN NOTE TO 'PEOPLE'

Says He's One of Worst That Canadian Politics Ever Uncarried

TORONTO, July 8.—The Mail and Empire this morning publishes a copy of a letter which it says was sent out from Ottawa under date of June 30 by Miss Agnes MacPhail, M. P. for South-east Grey in the last Parliament, and addressed to "My Dear People."

In the letter, Miss MacPhail outlined the situation in Ottawa in the days just before it was written and, speaking of the smuggling probe, says that the customs department has been, under Jacques Bureau, very badly administered. Much revenue has been lost, and he placed at the head of the protective service in the port of Montreal a man called Bisailon, who is one of the worst rascals that Canadian politics have ever uncared for.

Later in the letter, the former member for South-east Grey states that the King administration, it resigned. "While they were defeated that night in the House three times out of four, none of the motions were Government motions. I am more convinced than ever that the two-party system is morally wrong. They are so busy trying to get into power or to stay in power, they think only of discrediting the other fellow as a means to the end they desire. They have no time left to conduct business of the country."

QUESTION ROUSES FEELING IN HOUSE

Neville Chamberlain Hits Back at Insinuations by Laborite

LONDON, July 8.—Considerable feeling was aroused in the House of Commons today by a question put by T. Johnston, Labor, Dundee, who asked whether Neville Chamberlain, Minister of Health, was still a director of a limited liability company in Birmingham.

Premier Stanley Baldwin replied that the company was a private family concern and therefore it was excluded from the rule that ministers of the crown resign directorships.

Arthur Henderson, Labor, Burnley, obtained leave from Premier Baldwin to table a motion to enable the whole matter to be discussed.

INDIA THREATENED BY WAR WITH REDS

Continuation of Soviet's Aims to Peril Peace, Says British Officer

CALCUTTA, July 8.—War within the present generation is likely to occur over India if the Soviet Government continues its present policy with relation to that country, Col. M. Saunders, director of military operations of the British army in India, believes.

Colonel Saunders, lecturing on the defense of India, said special attention should be given to the fact that the best line of advance through India lay through Afghanistan. The main pressure by the Soviet Government upon India, he said, came from this direction. If the Soviet continued its present policy it must result in war within the present generation, he concluded.

NEW YORK, July 8.—There is no "12-mile limit" preventing seizure beyond that point for United States ships, according to a decision of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals made public today in reversing a finding in the United States District Court of the District of Connecticut.

The Connecticut decision had sustained objections to a Government libel run against the United States ships, the Underwriter was seized beyond the 12-mile limit, a fact upon which one of the exceptions was based.
