

22 CANDIDATES IN FIELD FOR FEDERAL HONORS IN PROVINCE

Straight Contests in All N. B. Constituencies Except in
Victoria-Carleton, Where Woman Independent Op-
poses Conservative and Liberal-Progressive

THE first woman ever nominated in New Brunswick for the House of Commons has tossed her headgear into the ring with the derbies and fedoras of the 22 men candidates for federal political honors. She is Mrs. Minnie Bell Adney, who was nominated at Woodstock yesterday to run in Carleton-Victoria as an independent candidate. Mrs. Adney's agent is Helen McGibbon who put up the necessary \$200 deposit required of the aspirants for political distinction.

With the entry of a woman into the contest came the departure of a man, namely James Robinson, of Millerton, who had signified his intention of running as an independent Conservative in Northumberland but who yesterday announced that, at the request of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the party, he would retire. This leaves just one three-cornered fight, in Carleton-Victoria, where Mrs. Adney is opposing T. W. Caldwell, Liberal-Progressive, and Hon. J. K. Flemming, Conservative. In all other constituencies there are straight party fights.

23 CANDIDATES.

Twenty-three seekers after the 11 seats to which the province of New Brunswick is entitled in the House of Commons of Canada were nominated yesterday, nomination day. In many of the constituencies there were public meetings in connection with the formal proceedings and the candidates gave addresses.

A misunderstanding regarding the arrangements for Charlotte county made the meeting at St. Andrews a one-sided affair. The report had gone abroad that there would be no speaking and, as a result, W. A. Holt, the Liberal candidate, was not present. His opponent, R. Watson Grimmer, however, gave an address.

SPECIAL TRAIN.

A special train over the International Railway brought many from Madawaska and along the International Railway to hear the candidates, Hon. Pius Michaud, Liberal, and Arthur Cullen, Conservative, speak at Campbellton. There was a big meeting at Bathurst, where J. G. Robichaud, the

Liberal standard-bearer, and J. B. Hachey, the Conservative, gave addresses. At Newcastle Charles E. Fish, the Conservative standard-bearer, and F. M. Tweedle, the Liberal, spoke and at Richibucto the Kent county opponents, Louis Robichaud, Government, and A. J. Doucet, Opposition, spoke.

MERELY FORMAL.

There was no speech-making at Dorchester in connection with the Westmorland county proceedings, neither was there any at Woodstock for Carleton-Victoria, nor at Fredericton for York-Sunbury. Only four people were present at the ceremonies in the capital. At Hampton, however, Geo. B. Jones, the Conservative candidate, and Dr. D. H. McAllister, the Liberal, addressed the crowd.

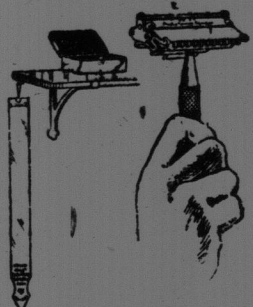

From the account received at the department it appears that Mr. Matthews, who was undergoing a course on flying instruction at Camp Borden, was flying solo in an avro training aeroplane. He was trying a landing test, it is stated, during the course of his qualification for pilot, and, when approaching the ground, the machine appeared to lose flying speed, stalled and fell. The machine was too close to the ground to allow the pilot to regain control. Pilot Matthews, it is reported, was instantly killed.

It was decided that the club should affiliate with the local Council of

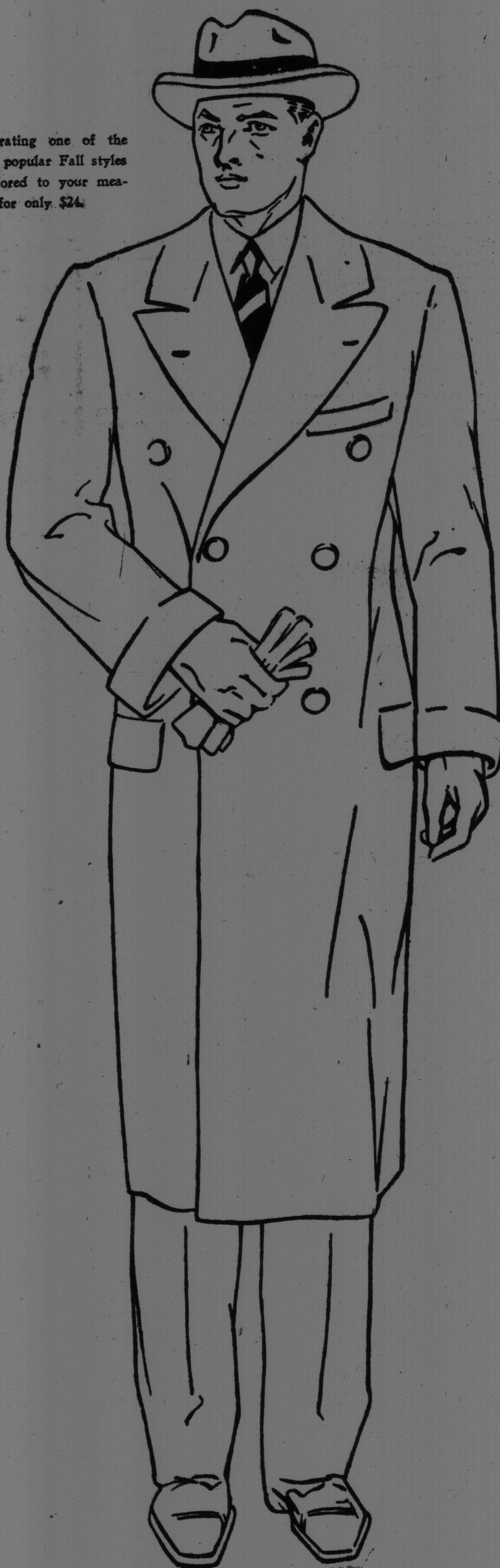
