Times this morning points out that
among the various market opinions to
be heard around the street, the best
seems to be "bullish but scared." That
attitude seems to represent the best
opinion at this time. Fundamentals
continue increasingly bullish but indus-
trial stocks have gone so far and so fast
that one hesitates to advise the pur-
chase of any stocks at current levels.
Yet we think a good many issues will
reach higher prices when buying a
stock one must remember the chances
he is taking but at the same time we
believe there are stocks that can still
be bought. Steel common did the ex-
traordinary thing yesterday. We do not think its
advance will stop here and we also be-
lieve there will be further advances in
the industrials. AGK preferred and
common are a purchase at present fig-
ures. American Ice should go higher.
