The contrast between the McGaughey murder trial in Lindsay and the Leopold-Loeb murder trial in Chicago is striking. The plea of insanity was advised on behalf of the Lindsay murderer but there were no almost interminable court sessions, held day after day, to present wearisome arguments in respect of this insanity. Instead, the whole trial occupied but a relatively few hours and it took the jury itself only four hours to bring in a verdict of guilty. That is the difference between Canadian justice and American justice and emphasizes the shocking condition in the United States, and why mur-

derers over there have such an easy time.

We have already called attention to the shocking number of murders in the States—in Chicago, one a day—and the more shocking fact that many of the murderers escape punishment at the hands of the law. The figures as prepared by the Statistical Department of the Metropolitan Insurance Company are eloquent of this since they show that out of 146 homicides, including 114 manslaughter or murder cases, there was actually only one murderer who suffered the death penalty. Of the others there were thirty-five sent to the Penitentiary, one was fined, one was paroled and the rest are either unapprehended, have been set free or are awaiting trial. It is no wonder that the most eminent jurists and the best men in the States are wondering how it is possible to overcome this breakdown in the administration of the law. One of the suggested remedies is to procure a standard code of criminal procedure for all the States but in view of the fact that each State is peculiarly jealous of its own rights, it is scarcely possible that any such code will ever be adopted.
