
HAD TO GIVE UP THE AUTOMOBILE
Judge Decides Gift to Prospective Son-in-Law Must be Returned.
London, March 13. — (By Canadian Press.)—A prospective parent-in-law's gift to a prospective son-in-law absolute or conditional? Mr. Justice Bray, in a case tried in court here recently, decided that such a gift is conditional upon the expected marriage taking place, and that, as there was no marriage, the gift had to be returned. The gift in question was a handsome motor car, which Miss Eunice Vera Jeffrey's mother had presented to William Lark shortly after he had become engaged to her daughter.

The engagement was broken off, and Miss Jeffrey telephoned to Lark and said she supposed he intended returning the car. He replied that certainly he had no such intention. He was threatened with legal proceedings and retorted that he would fight.
The defendant, in giving evidence in the case, said that he considered "a gift" was his private property, and that he could have sold it, if necessary—part could have been sold, and the rest leased, restraining him from doing so. Altogether apart from the law, he felt justified in keeping the car, because the judge, he added, that he thought Mrs. Jeffrey had given him the car as an inducement to stick to his engagement with her daughter. This drew caustic comment from the judge.

MORE THAN SIX THOUSAND CARS

Kentville, N. S., March 9.—(Owing to the vast importance of the apple industry to the Annapolis Valley, and in fact the whole of Nova Scotia, an apology is offered by your correspondent for this article, which is due to having just sent in to the Morning Chronicle the total shipments of apples from the Annapolis Valley for the season now closing. The figures are astounding. Just this of it: 6,204 carloads of apples have been shipped from this section of Nova Scotia, to Halifax, for export alone. That means approximately one million three hundred and thirty thousand nine hundred barrels, and that is by no means all of them, for there are still a trifle of 15,000 barrels left for export, besides the thousands of barrels that were used for canning, evaporators, cider, vinegar, etc.

The apple industry of the Valley is decidedly growing. Year by year the orchards are encroaching upon the agricultural parts of all farms suitably located and it won't be many years until the farmers growing apples will be devoting their entire farms and efforts to growing apples.
In a conversation with a very conservative old apple grower, today, in five, or at the very most, ten years, that section of country tributary to Kentville known as the North Mountain Branch, would be producing more apples yearly, and better ones than are now produced in the Annapolis Valley all the way from Grand Pre to Annapolis Royal.

SAYS GOVERNMENT SHOULD SET PAGE

The line of least resistance has been repeatedly followed by public authorities during the past six or seven years. The willingness of the people to submit to taxation for war purposes was taken as precedent for mounting tax bills. When given the alternative of choosing between curtailment of expenditures or creation of new forms of revenue our governments chose the latter—they took the line of least resistance. But the time has arrived, as a matter of fact, it is overdue, when our governments must do what they are continually advising the citizens to do—cut down expenditures. Taxation has reached its peak and must come down and the only way to reduce taxation is to reduce expenditure. We repeat that so that the point will not be overdone in our minds, the U. S. government has made the same mistake that we are making. We are living away beyond our means, money is being spent on things we can do without and it would seem that attention should be given to the reduction of expenditures and less attention given to creating new sources of revenue. The necessary previous administration of killing the enterprise, energy and ambition of all classes; it is the beginning of the end; it is the modern method of killing the goose that lays the golden egg.
The expenditures of our governments have mounted to stupendous heights during the past six years. 
