AIRCRAFT DESTROY THREE SUBMARINES

Summer Conditions Enable Seaplanes and Dirigibles to Spread Havec Among Them
London, June 12.—Accounts of the destruction of three enemy submarines by British aircraft are published. It is explained that the longer hours of day-light enable seaplanes, dirigibles, and light balloons to assist materially in hunting down U-boats. Summer conditions favor the submarine hunters, whose incessant searching of the seas forces German craft to seek deeper waters.
An observer in a British towing balloon sighted certain things which, to his trained eye, indicated the presence of a U-boat at a great depth. Depth charges were dropped, and the submarine was obliged to shift its position. The balloon continued on watch, and an hour later a submarine was observed to emerge a long distance away on the horizon and start shelling a sailing vessel. The balloon was towed rapidly to the spot, and in the meantime the U-boat was forced to submerge by shots from the towing vessel. Under the direction of the balloon observer the towing vessel got over the track of the

U-boat and dropped nine depth charges. A large quantity of oil came to the surface, spreading gradually until it covered an area of a square mile.
A British dirigible sighted a U-boat submerged and dropped a bomb three feet astern. A quantity of oil came to the surface. The dirigible dropped a second bomb, scoring a direct hit, and lifting the submarine to the surface momentarily, after which it disappeared in a pool of oil.

The disturbance continued for so long a time it was evident the submarine was mortally wounded.

\$2,000,000,000 TAXES TO BE PAID THIS WEEK

Treasury Watching the Effect Big Collection Will Have on Securities Market
Washington, June 12.—The biggest payment of federal taxes in the history of the nation will be made this week. More than two billion dollars in income and excess profits taxes from individuals and corporations is due next Saturday night, in addition to the half billion which already has been paid this year. Total receipts from these sources are expected to be about \$2,775,000,000.

More than 6,000,000 separate payments of income taxes are to be made, and in excess profits tax payments. Approximately three-fourths of the total tax will come from corporations, and about one-fourth from individuals. Millions of persons will pay income taxes for the first time. As an indication of the huge task imposed on the internal revenue machinery of the government, with its sixty-four collection districts, it is recalled that last year only 780,000 income tax payments were made under a former law, and \$800,000,000 was received on incomes.

Many corporations and big business interests face the necessity of selling securities this week, according to reports to the treasury, and officials are watching carefully the effect on the money and securities markets. A method of installment payments in advance was arranged under the law, but comparatively few corporations took advantage of it. Under another plan, however, the treasury in the last six months has sold more than \$1,500,000,000 of certificates of

DEATH LOSSES GRIP UPON ANNA HELD

New York, June 12.—Anna Held, actress, who has been critically ill here for many weeks, has "won her battle and will undoubtedly live," according to a bulletin issued last night by her physicians, who added that "she still has a long, hard fight ahead."

FOUR TORPEDOES FAIL TO SINK STEAMSHIP

Missing Three Times, U-Boat Run Ahead and Lies in Wait—Crew Saves Vessel
London, June 12.—A Belfast steamship, torpedoed by a German submarine while bound from England, has reached an Irish port, badly damaged. Three of the crew were killed by the explosion of the torpedoes.

No fewer than four torpedoes were discharged by the submarine. The vessel was maneuvered so adroitly, however, that three of them missed their mark. The attack was made at night, and the explosion of the torpedoes, which was fired at close range, tore a great hole in the starboard side. The fifty-seven surviving members of the crew took to the boats.

At daybreak the vessel was still afloat, but well down by the head. The crew, which had abandoned ship, went back on board, although the forward deck was awash, determined to take her to port.

The men succeeded in getting the disabled wireless plant into operation again, and flashed an urgent call for help. They were powerless, as the ship was unmanageable, and would have been easy prey for a submarine if one had been in the vicinity. Two tugs came up and towed the fine steamship safely to port.

WAR SUMMARY

The French troops fighting south-east of Montdidier have turned upon the Germans in a violent attack and administered a severe defeat to the enemy over a front of about seven and a half miles between Ribescourt and St. Maur. It was over this front that the French since Sunday's offensive began had held the Germans from keeping pace with the advance they were making from the west bank of the Oise River. Hard fighting is still in progress in this region, with the French disputing the attempts of the Germans to press onward.

The American marines fighting in the Chateau Thierry sector have completed the capture of the Belleau Wood from the Germans and with its occupation took 300 prisoners.

The German war office claims the capture of 10,000 additional prisoners which with the number of captives reported Monday would bring the total to 16,000 in the present fighting.

In one of the most ambitious operations carried out in many days, Field Marshal Haig's troops in the Amiens sector have struck the Germans a nasty blow. It was the Australians who carried out the manoeuvre and they succeeded in advancing their lines half a mile over a mile and half front and took nearly 300 prisoners, including five officers.
