### BRINGS WORD FROM OTTAWA

#### THAT ELECTION IS LIKELY

Bardeen Said to Have Given Instructions to Prepare—Liberals Eager for It

Inside information from Ottawa received today was taken to indicate that a general election was almost an absolute certainty. A gentleman who has just returned from the dominion capital received the news from a close friend and political associate of Premier Borden, who had received instructions to prepare for a contest. The intention of the government to seek dissolution and call a general election if the Liberals continue their vigorous fight along the present line. As the Liberals are prepared to continue almost indefinitely it is believed there is little doubt regarding the matter.

One of the interesting features of the situation is the delay of the debate on the supply. The fiscal year will end with this month and the supply should be voted before the end of March. The opposition is prepared to continue the naval debate until April if necessary, and this would precipitate a serious situation for the government.

The opposition is looking forward eagerly to the prospect of a general election. They assert that there is no doubt regarding the comparative popularity of the two parties, and are quite willing to leave the matter to the judgment of the voters. In the event of a general election the Liberals are confident of securing a sufficient gain to give them a good working majority in the next parliament.

## BRISK BUILDING AT COURTENAY BAY PROMISES

### Sale of Many Lots to Men on the Work as Well as to Others Reported

The Courtenay Bay district promises to begin to come into its own as a thriving suburb of the city this summer. Last year little more than a start was made, but the prospects seem to indicate a building boom in that section this summer.

One of the strongest indications of this is the numerous sales of building lots to men employed with the contracting companies. Many of these men, especially the foremen and skilled mechanics are well able to provide suitable homes for themselves, and they are preparing to do so. Some of the men figure that when the work on hand is completed there will be other contracts that will keep them busy for at least ten years, and they look upon a house and a good investment even if they have to move away.

There has been a fairly steady sale of lots to city people and outside investors, but those who are interested in Courtenay Bay look to the movement on the part of residents to secure homes for themselves to make the first big step in the development of the district. As the building of new dwellings continues others will be attracted also, and by the time the street railway is extended in that direction things will be ready for even more rapid development.

## ONE MORE DREDGE WILL BE ALL FOR PRESENT

### Norton Griffiths Manager of the Department Says Start by April First

E. J. Dinneen, manager of the Norton Griffiths Dredging Company, returned to the city today. He announced that the company expects to commence dredging on the Courtenay Bay channel by April 1. They have on hand here two dredges, one dipper and one of the elevator type, and the work will be commenced with these. A second elevator dredge suitable to local requirements can be secured, it will be ordered to the west, but this will be as many as can be handled for the present season.

Later on much of the work will be done with dredges of the suction type, but they will not be brought into use until the season has been constructed and the material lifted by the dredge can be used in filling in and reclaiming the shore land needed in connection with the various projects for harbor development.

## HUNDRED AND THIRTY PATIENTS IN HOSPITAL

### Greater Number Than at Any Time in Recent Years

The number of patients now being attended to in the General Public Hospital is greater than at any period during the last few years, and the members of the medical and nursing staff have been particularly busy looking after the increased rush. There are now being treated in the main hospital one hundred and fifteen patients, and in the epidemic building fifteen more. These latter are cases of scarlet fever for the most part. Some of these in the hospital have been there for several weeks, while others have just been added within the last week, and of course each day sees new faces in the wards.

Different reasons are ascribed for the presence of the large number of patients now housed in the hospital. There has been much sickness about the city during the last month or two but the fact that more people are resorting to the use of the institution for treatment of their illness is cited as speaking well for its popularity, and for the standard of the work performed.

## SEVEN SENT IN TO AWAIT DECISION AS TO THEIR CASES

Ten men were on the prisoners' bench in the police court this morning, six of them charged with drunkenness and one with vagrancy. Sitting Magistrate Henderson, who presided in the absence of Magistrate Ritchie, remanded the seven as he did not think the police law would apply to them, all of them having been before the court on previous occasions. They may have to stand trial under the vagrancy law. Of the lot three have served time in Dorchester. Jeremiah Daley was sentenced to two years in 1906 for breaking and entering the store of Phillip McQuire. John McQuire went to Dorchester for three years in 1901 for stealing and Robert Dixon has also been sentenced for stealing.

Harry Ross and Robert Ross, brothers, arrested on Saturday night on charge of creating a disturbance and using profane language in the Salvation Army barracks, Rodney street, west side, were remanded.

One man charged with drunkenness was fined \$4 or 10 days.

## COMMISSIONERS TALK OVER SUBURBAN RAILWAY BILL

The city commissioners spent this morning discussing the bill to incorporate the St. John Suburban Railway Company. When the bill comes before the committee of the legislature it is quite possible that the opinion of the city commissioners may be asked regarding the various provisions and they wish to be prepared to deal with the matter.
