NORTH END MAN WAS LOST IN WOODS BACK OF GRAND BAY

Rachael Belyea, of Victoria Lane Caused His Friends Great Anxiety—He Was Found This Morning

Considerable anxiety was caused for a part of this morning and all last night, among his friends in North End, and particularly in his family and among his relatives, when word reached the city by telephone that Rachael Belyea, of Victoria Lane, had become lost in the woods in the vicinity of Grand Bay, and that though search had been made for him, he could not be found.

It was with great relief, this morning, however, that the joyful tidings were brought to the friends and relatives that he had been found by W. H. Dunham, without having suffered any apparent injury from exposure and hunger, although at the time, he was naturally somewhat exhausted.

Mr. Dunham was one of a searching party, composed of Wm. Brown, C. W. Wais, and the last man's two brothers, Byron and Myles, which left at once to endeavor to locate his whereabouts.

After arriving at Grand Bay, the searching party divided into sections, and each member of it, armed with a gun, which he discharged into the air as he went, in order to encourage a world wide search.

It is understood, however, that the foreign names and surnames have been instructed to encourage a world wide search of the night air, he felt refreshed and he was able to return to the city.

N. Curry is New President

Nathaniel Curry, president of the Canada Car and Foundry Co., and a director of the Bank of Nova Scotia, was elected president of the directors of the Canadian Car and Foundry Co. on Saturday.
