WOODSMEN ARE TURNED BACK AT U. S. BORDER

(Fredericton Gleaner)

A party of twenty New Brunswick woodsmen who had to go to Maine to work for one of the large corporations there were turned back by U. S. immigration inspectors at Vanceboro and returned here yesterday afternoon.

Some of the woodsmen, it was said, divulged to the officials that they had entered into contracts on this side of the boundary to go to work in Maine and this constituted an infringement of the U. S. immigration regulations. The incident in addition to showing the tightened conditions respecting entry of non-residents into the United States, also shows the demand for woodsmen, it being said that \$75 a month had been guaranteed to some of the members of the party with the hope that they might be able to make \$4 per day.
