### CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY MEETS

The monthly meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held last night in the Children's Aid Home, 88 Garden street, with the president, A. M. Bold, in the chair. A considerable amount of routine business was transacted. During the evening the president warmly welcomed three new members of the board. They were Mrs. W. E. Raymond, Mrs. Leon A. Keith and George A. Henderson.

The monthly report of the agent showed there are at present in the Children's Aid Home twenty-seven children and for some days twenty-eight slept on the premises. One of the babies in the Home, a foundling, died during the month and was buried from Brennan's undertaking parlors with services conducted by Rev. Hugh Miller. Eight children were committed to the care of the society since the last meeting. Five of these are in another institution at present. Two are in the Children's Aid Home where they have been resident for some time and the eighth is in a prospective foster home. One hearing was before Chief Justice McKinnon and two before Rev. R. A. Armstrong and Rev. William M. Duke. Argument in the Ellis case was also heard before Magistrate Adams, when the defendant was found guilty.

### BIT OF PLAID HELPS SCOTCH GIRLS FIND NEW YORK HOME

Saved From Detention at Ellis Island When They Match Piece of Gay Ribbon.

New York, Feb. 8.—A bit of plaid ribbon saved two Scotch girls from going to Ellis Island yesterday when they arrived on the Anchor liner Columbia from Glasgow. They were the Misses Winifred and Kathleen Coyne, sisters, twenty and eighteen years old, respectively.

Michael Conboy, who was a friend of the girls' parents back in the old country, was at the pier when the liner docked and was wearing a bit of the ribbon in his buttonhole. He watched the passengers leaving the ship and when the last one came down the gangplank he appealed to one of the officials of the company, explaining that he was to meet the two young women

who were to wear pieces of ribbon to match his.

He was taken aboard the Columbia where the passengers were being examined by the immigration inspectors preparatory to going to Ellis Island when the girls rushed into his arms. There was an affectionate greeting although he hadn't seen them since they were children and the immigration authorities permitted them to join Conboy and go to his wife and their new home.

### ASSAULT ON PROHIBITION FUTILE, ASSERTS WHEELER

Anderson Charges Unfounded, Says Dry League Heads; Funds Still Behind Cause, He Adds.

Baltimore, Feb. 8.—"There is no more chance of the prohibition amendment being repealed than there is of a rabbit getting safely through a kennel," this statement was made here by Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel of the Anti-Saloon League, who came to Baltimore to make an address at St. John's Methodist Protestant Church. "How about the withdrawal of financial support from the league on the part of its wealthy supporters—the Rockefellers, for instance?" Mr. Wheeler was asked.

Says Funds Still Flow In.

"There is no general diminution in the amount of money being given for the league for its work," was the reply. "The Rockefeller withdrawal may have been a blow to the New York League, but there is no indication that they have stopped their support. There are other people who have given more. I think the attack on Mr. Anderson unfounded. The executive committee has appointed a committee to take up the facts, and full information eventually will be given to the public."

In his address at St. John's Methodist Protestant Church Mr. Wheeler declared that the enforcement of prohibition brings good results and is sustained by the people. Calls Wet Post "Swindle."

"The fake poll," he continued, "of the National Liberal Alliance and other wet organizations to make it appear that the people are against prohibition and that it is a failure is the most gigantic swindle ever initiated. The poll means absolutely nothing. There is nothing to prevent one person from casting a thousand ballots on this brewery propaganda scheme. The statement that 10,000,000 votes had been cast for beer and wine in upstate New York and New England shows its unreliability. There are not that many voters in New York City, upstate New York and all of New England combined."

Died at Queensbury.

The death occurred at Lower Queensbury Tuesday night of Miss Emily Myhrall, aged seventy years. She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Jane Donnelly of Kingsclear.

### AVIATORS LAND AFTER LONG TRIP

Party of Five End 5,000-Mile Journey at Rio Janeiro—One Plane Wrecked

Rio Janeiro, Feb. 8.—Lieutenant Walter Hinton, the U. S. aviator, arrived here today, completing his seaplane light from New York to Rio Janeiro.

Lieut. Hinton and his four companions by their arrival at Rio Janeiro have completed a journey of more than five thousand miles. They left New York on January 17. The original plane was wrecked in landing off Cuba. From Cuba the route led through the West Indies to Trinidad and thence to Georgetown, British Guiana, from which point the aviators followed the South American coast line to their destination.

Lieut. Hinton is best known to Canadians through his adventures as a member of the party of U. S. airmen who composed the crew of a runaway naval balloon which made the sensational flight to Moose Factory, Northern Ontario, in December, 1920.

### INGS "NEARER TO THEE" AND DIES AS SHE FORSAW

Ten-year-old Girl Feels Presence of Death and Asks Neighbors to Play Hymn.

New York, Feb. 8.—"Nearer, My God, to Thee" has been the favorite hymn of Mrs. Mary Sheldrick of Queens, N. J., since she attended Sunday school when she was a girl. She celebrated her fortieth birthday a few days ago, and when several friends gathered she sang the hymn for them. The next day she was taken ill, and unnamed Mrs. Adam Brenner, a neighbor and close friend, to her bedside.

"Mrs. Brenner, I'm going to die," she said calmly. "Will you play an accompaniment while I sing 'Nearer, My God, to Thee'?"

Mrs. Brenner went to the piano and played a soft accompaniment while Mrs. Sheldrick sang the words of her favorite song. At the end she smiled at her neighbor and sank back into the pillows, dead.

### RAPS CHILDLESS WIFE

Housewives' Association Petitions N. Y. Legislature.

Albany, Feb. 8.—The Association of Overworked, Underpaid, Dishwashing Housewives has written a letter to each member of the Legislature asking for help. It proposes no legislative acts, but, after presenting what it calls some "old-fashioned ideas," tells the law makers that "in the interest of the public welfare the betterment of the condition of the childless wife should cease."

"We believe wives under fifty years of age and having no children should be compelled to do housework three days each week for wives under fifty years of age who have children," says the communication.

The association claims a membership of 4,000,000 and declares that its headquarters are "by the cook stove and the cradle, with the wash tub near by."

## LIQUOR BILL "WITH TEETH" APPROVED BY GOV. PINCHOT

Drastic Measures To Be Presented; Framed to Stop Bootlegging.

Harrisburg, Pa., Feb. 8.—Elimination of all licensed saloons, enforced provisions with "teeth" in them, and a search and seizure clause that "goes even beyond the constitution of Pennsylvania in protecting the rights of law-abiding citizens" are features of the administration's prohibition enforcement bill introduced in the General Assembly this week.

Governor Pinchot said the measure was in exact accord with his campaign pledge. "It provides far better means than ever before to prevent and punish bootlegging," the Governor declared.

"Not only is the manufacture, sale, transportation, delivery or possession (except when lawfully acquired before this act goes into effect) of intoxicating liquor declared to be unlawful," said Governor Pinchot, "but so is the advertisement, sale, manufacture or contrivance, tablet or formula designed or intended for use in the unlawful manufacture of intoxicating liquor."
