ligh Church Angilean Clearyman Had a Stormy Career and His Adherence to Ritualism Occasioni ed Many Bitter Attacks—Noncon-

men Alike Testified to His Work.

One of the most magnetic personalities in London has been lost by the death of the Rev. A. H. Stanton (Tather Stanton), curate of St. Alban's, Holborn, Eng., which occurred in his 75th year, recently. The great knowledge of human nature that he possessed was one of the elements of his wonderful popularity. He knew the immost secrets of unnumbered souls; indeed, there are few priests in the metropolis who have heard more consections that he was certainly the most picturesque prescher of he age. He was very good-looking, with deep-set, flashing eyes and striking features; he had a fine voice and knew how to manage it with superbeflect. Numberless women — young, middle-aged, and elderly — adored him. Mr. Stanton had been curate of St. Alban's since the church was opened in 1863, the year in which he was ordained. Throughout that period he never received any stipend. His death follows with dramatic suddenness upon the official recognition of his untiring devotion and labor for the Church by the offer, a few days previously, of a prebendal stall in St. Paul's Cathedral. The offer was declined on grounds of ill-health and old age.

St. Alban's, Holborn, was built 60 years ago by Lord Addington, formerly 76hn Gellibrand Hubbard, with the co-operation of William Henry, second Lord of Leigh, and Alexander Heriot Mackonochie, of Oxford, the first vicer. Lord Addington's great purpose was to do something for the poor of the City of London, and so he decided to build a heautiful

church in the centre of a slum. Holborn, then one of the most squalid and unsavory localities in all London, was chosen. The site of the church in Brooke street is of historical interest. There the thieves' kitchen, immortalized by Dickens in "Oliver Twist," is supposed to have stood. Brooke street itself is named after that Lord Brooke who, in Elizabeth's day, was an author and patron of literature. It was in Brooke street, too, that Chatterton, the boy poet, died by his own hand at a house which has now disappeared. The extreme character of the ritual adopted at St. Alban's caused controversies to rage round the church for many years. Indeed, Father Stanton was accused by some of being a Papist in disguise. The idol of one side and the bugbear of the other, he was at one time prevented from preaching in four dioceses.
