In the present case a stretch of 300 feet of pipe between a house and the street main was solidly frozen. One wire was attached to the pipe in the cellar, and the other to a faucet across the street. The flow of the current was down the service pipe, along the main, and by way of the frozen pipe to ecessary to heat the pipe to sixty degrees, and it is stated that within twenty minutes there was a full head of water in the cellar.
