Tunisian Met Heavy Gaies - Several Injured

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 17.—Three days overdue from Liverpool and after the worst voyage she has ever made, the Allan liner Tunisian arrived this afternoon. The Tunisian left Liverpool on the evening of Friday, Jan. 7, and under ordinary weather conditions should have arrived here last Friday afternoon. She, however, met the full force of the heavy gales that have been sweeping over the North Atlantic for the last couple of weeks. Every day it was a fight of the shin against the elements.

Although the steamer came through without sustaining any damage, her passengers and crew were not so fortunate, for two of the saloon passengers and two seamen were injured during the gale.

Capt. Fairful said it was one of the worst trips he had ever made. From the time they cleared the channel until they arrived at 47 west longitude, they were running into a heavy gale and on one day, Sunday, January 9, they made 133 miles.

While the storm was at its height Madame Tramblay, saloon passenger, was thrown to a deck and injured. On the same day a young man, also a saloon passenger, was injured by a fall on the dack. Of the seamen injured, one of them had several ribs broken.

She purchased estates from various land owners, mostly in Hungary, and gave bills of exchange which show that she owes \$1,600,000. The princess owes Frau Stoeger, her former chaperon, over \$80,000.

In addition there are many unpaid debts incured by Princess Louise in Vienna when she was the wife of Prince Philip of Coburg. Her former husband paid about \$450,000 on her behalf, and she owes another \$300,000.

Most of her creditors in Vienna are dressmakers and jewelers.

A curious debt is one of \$15,000 due to Herr Weizer, who financed the princess' flight from Lindenhof Asylum, near Dresden, where she was detained by the order of her husband.

In this connection it has been ascertained that the late King Leopold apparently made an extraordinary mistake when he estimated the amount of the fortune bequeathed to his three daughters.

According to the will published shortly after his majesty's death, he stated that the amount was \$8,000,000, being the estate inherited from his father, Leopold I.

Later, however, when Baron Goffinet, the king's secretary, met the solicitors of the three princesses, the inventory prepared by the baron showed the king's fortune to be \$11,000,000, including \$4,000,000 in certain shares.

There is now little probability of any of the princesses instituting lawsuuts against Baroness Vaughan, King Leopold's reputed wife. The announcement that their legacies will be more than three times the sum expected in accordance with King Leopold's estimate has caused great gratification in Brussels.
