How St. John Received News of Death of William IV.

And How the Ascension of Princess Alexandrina Victoria to the Throne was Celebrated

In This City as Well as at the Capital of the Province—A Quaintly Worded Proclamation—Some Interesting Local History.

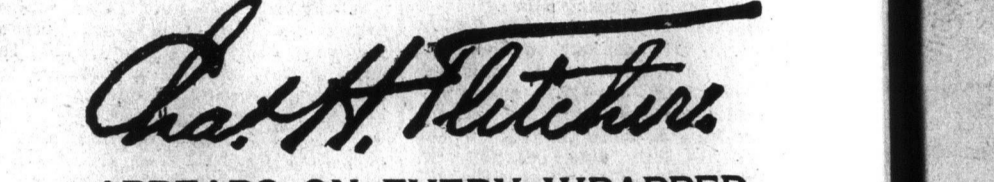

PROCLAIMING THE QUEEN IN NEW BRUNSWICK. (The Courier, Aug. 12, 1837.) From the Royal Gazette Extra.

FREDERICKTON, August 5.—His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor having this day received official accounts of the demise of his late Majesty, of blessed and glorious memory, and the accession of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria to the Imperial Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the dominions thereunto belonging—directions were immediately given by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor for the proclaiming of the Queen, with the requisite solemnities and ceremonies.

PROCLAMATION. Whereas it has pleased Almighty God to call to His mercy our late Sovereign Lord King William the Fourth, of blessed and glorious memory, by whose decease the Imperial Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the dominions thereunto belonging, is solely and rightfully come to the high and mighty Princess Alexandrina Victoria, saving the rights of any issue of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, which may be born of His Majesty's Consort.

Given at the City of Saint John this eighth day of August, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven.

God Save the Queen. The Proclamation was immediately signed by His Worship the Mayor, the Chief Justice, the Sheriff, the Coroner, Magistrates and a great number of the inhabitants, during which time a double Royal Salute was fired from the Royal Artillery and a feu de joie by the 43rd Regiment.
