It may be stated boldly that the Grand Trunk deal is the main dependence of the government for the campaign funds. The original act is worth many millions to the beneficiaries and a few millions to the individual promoters "on the ground floor." But the original act was not sufficient, and the contracting party was allowed to change the deal in five important particulars. The changes were largely in the financial terms, and one alone would place eight or ten millions of cash at the disposal of the promoters, which could not be obtainen under the first act.
