GOLD MEDALS FOR HIGH SCHOOL ONLY UNDER PRESENT REGULATION

Committee Reports to School Board That St. Vincent's Students Cannot Legally Win Corporation or Parker Medals—Recommend That Section be Changed—Lady Teachers Ask for Increase

The most interesting business before the board of school trustees at their monthly meeting last evening was the report of the committee appointed to consider the medals of the Corporation and the Parker gold medals. At the last competition for these medals they were both won by pupils of the St. Vincent's school and the point being raised that they were not entitled only for competition by the pupils of the St. John High School, a committee was appointed to pass an opinion.

The committee's report was submitted last evening and upheld the contention. The board then decided to have other medals struck for the successful pupils in the St. Vincent school and award the medals in question to the pupils in the High School who made the highest standing in the competition.

A delegation of the female teachers also interwove the board in support of an application for increased salaries. The chairman announced that the request would have the careful consideration of the board. It was afterwards referred to a committee.

At the meeting R. B. Emerson presided and Trustees Smith, Agar, Bullock, Day, Lockhart and Russell were present with Supt. Bridges, Secretary Leavitt, Truant Officer McMan and the stenographer.

The minutes of the last regular meeting as well as the special meeting held to consider the Winter street school charges, were read and adopted. It appeared from the minutes of the special meeting from which the newspaper representatives were excluded that Mr. Day taught the only one to vote against the majority report.

Delegation of Ladies. The delegation of ladies was then introduced. It was headed by Miss Barlow and the other members were Miss McLeod, Miss Keegan, Miss McNally and Miss Magee.

Miss Barlow read a resolution passed at the meeting of the teachers' association authorizing the delegation and also a petition in which they asked for a rearrangement of the salary schedule.

The petition requested that the board should grant to Day teachers on the regular staff an increase of \$50 over the sum paid to reserve teachers, and that there should be annual increases of \$25 for four years. Teachers' salaries on the staff should receive an increase of \$30 with annual increases of \$5.

Miss McNally also spoke in support of the petition. She said the cost of living had increased and this was the reason for the increase. No Canadian city of equal size and importance paid its teachers as low a rate as St. John. The increase would make a difference of \$2,000 a year in the estimates. In conclusion Miss McNally said she supposed the board would plead poverty as an excuse for not granting the increase, but that was just what brought the teachers to the board. Miss McLeod and Miss Magee also spoke in support of the petition.

The chairman announced that the petition would be considered by the board and the delegation withdrew. Afterwards the petition was referred to a committee of Trustees Russell, Bullock, Agar and Supt. Bridges.

Various Applications. Applications for positions on the staff from Misses Ethel G. Brown, Rita T. Grey, and Dora E. Jones, were referred to the teacher's committee. Miss Jones in her application announced that she was qualified to teach physical culture.

Miss Ida A. Moffatt applied for an increase of salary and Misses Eliza Hargrave and Annie E. Whittaker for leave of absence for six months. All applications were referred to the teacher's committee.

W. A. Nelson and Miss Phoebe Vanwart applied for an increase of salary. These were referred to teacher's committee.

As the representatives did not feel that they could count themselves at present until they had discussed the matter with their respective governments, no definite arrangement was reached, but Mr. Hazen expects that it will lead to an agreement more satisfactory to the lower provinces. He returned from Ottawa via Boston, reaching the city at noon yesterday.
