
While the world awaits news of the great battle in which the British and French allied forces and the Germans in Nor-thern France have engaged for twenty-six days, the meagre official reports from the front vouchsafe little information of and tomorrow the same ground has been regained. Mean-while the French forces are moving northward, but are gain-ing little to the eastward, which would be essential to the out-flanking of the German right wing. As a matter of fact, Gen. Von Kluck, in command of that section of the Germany army, with heavy reinforcements, which have reached him in the past week, has taken a decided offensive, and day by day the same announcement is made by the French war office that the "violent battle continues."
